**THREE BANDITS CAUGHT
BUT TWO MAKE ESCAPE**

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.—Two of four
bandits, said to have held up and
robbed a branch of the Danvers State
Bank in Montreal this morning, were
captured by a posse in a corn field
near here today. The two others
escaped and are being pursued. A
fifth man, said to be the driver of an
automobile in which the alleged band-
its escaped from Montreal, had been
captured previously.

Two thousand dollars of the five
thousand dollars stolen from the bank
is said to have been recovered. The
captured men gave the names of Ray
Spencer, Sam Bono and John Boison,
all of towns near Detroit.

ACTION AGAINST FIREMEN'S DAY OFF IS PLANNED

London First To Protest Leg-
islation—Matter For Local
Member.

TO CHANGE CAR STOPS

Women's Institute Convention
Here—No Action On Freight
Increase Fight.

London will protest against provin-
cial legislation to give firemen one day
off each week with pay. No. 1 com-
mittee of the city council received
communication from a number of cities
Wednesday afternoon, stating that they
had taken no action in the matter, and
it was decided it was up to London to
start the ball rolling. The adoption of
the legislation here would mean \$20,000
more on the annual cost of the depart-
ment.

The motion to protest was made by
Ald. Cameron Wilson and seconded by
Ald. John Bridge. Ald. Wilson said
that the matter should be brought to
the attention of the local member, Dr.
H. A. Stevenson, and that other cities
should be asked to co-operate. Ald.
Cunningham said that every fireman
got an average of 23 days off in the
year with pay. There would be no
objection to having a day off without
pay. He did not see why they should
be paid, as other workers received no
pay for Sundays. Ald. Bridge said if
they were not paid for the days off
it would be possible to hire enough
men to make the change without in-
creasing the cost of the upkeep. Ald.
Watkinson was not entirely in favor
of the action, contending that the fire-
men were continually on duty, whether
in uniform or not.

The report of Fire Chief Aitken on
the collegiate was received and filed.
The chief declared that the firemen
worked faithfully, and were in danger
at all times. Lack of fire walls per-
mitted the quick spread of the flames,
and the long lines of hose which it was
necessary to lay reduced the water

pressure fourteen or fifteen pounds. The
cause of the fire was lightning, the
chief thought.

Market Clerk Charles Maker reported
that no price "tickets" were being
dropped in the morning. Ald. Wat-
kinson said the report did not satisfy
him, but that he would have nothing
more to say for a week or two.

Ald. Harley was appointed the city's
representative to the Soldiers' Aid
Commission.

Press from all areas were raised from
three cents to ten cents a foot, while
coal-chute charges were advanced from
50 cents to \$1.00.

A communication from Manager C.
B. King of the street railway said that
the suggestions for changes in the
stops at Fullarton street and Beacons-
field avenue would be carried out.

Further consideration will be given
to the suggested omission of Market
lane and Carling street stops, as these
are used more generally.

The use of a hall was granted for a
convention of Women's Institutes to be
held here October 26, 27 and 28. It
was stated that members of the execu-
tive of this organization spent more
than \$1,000 at London stores and hotels
during the last convention.

**RESEARCH COUNCIL
FORECASTS SHORTAGE OF
COMMERCIAL ALCOHOL**

OTTAWA, Ont., Sept. 29.—(By Cana-
dian Press).—A statement from the
administrative chairman of the re-
search council states that there is a
shortage in Canada of alcohol for power
and industrial purposes. This short-
age will be world-wide and is already
developing abroad.

The supply of alcohol in Canada,
through the operation of the prohibi-
tion acts of the various provinces, has
in the last three years very consider-
ably decreased. The wholesale price
in Canada and the States is now
double what it was in January last
and it is likely to go much higher.

The research council is of the op-
inion that alcohol should be so operat-
ed in order to meet as far as possible the
demand at home and abroad. It is cer-
tain that plants, now idle, if used for
this purpose, will give satisfactory re-
turns for the next ten years at least,
and meet an urgent need in certain in-
dustries which otherwise may become
acute.

"MAKING A MESS OF INDIA," SAYS TRADE DELEGATE

Sir Alexander McRobert
Styles Dyer Case "A Posi-
tive Scandal."

UNARMED WOMEN SHOT

British Military Forces Set a
Dangerous Precedent by
Such Action.

WINDSOR, Sept. 29.—Declaring that
the striking coal miners in Britain
will be forced to agree to an amicable
compromise, because of the unsympa-
thetic attitude of other industrial
workers towards Government control
of the mines and the antipathy of public
opinion because of frequent and
extreme demands of the mine, Louis
Loughner, one of the delegates of the
imperial congress of chambers of com-
merce of the British Empire, told
the members of the chamber of com-
merce here tonight that Britain's in-
dustrial troubles were rapidly nearing
an end.

Discusses India.
Sir Alexander McRobert, another
member of the delegation, speaking of
the Indian situation, said, "They are
making a mess of India. The now-
famous Dyer case, where defenceless
women and children were shot down
in Amritsar, was a positive scandal.
Much has been said in England and
Canada, but people who have never
been in India do not know the danger
of setting such a precedent by British
military forces."

SCATTERED WEALTH AS HE
WALKED.

HAMILTON, Ont., Sept. 29.—W. A.
D. Baby, collector of inland revenue
in this city, received \$200 from the city
clerk here today. He thought he had
put the money in one of his pockets,
but instead had placed the roll of bills
inside the top of his trousers. He
walked along the street, unconsciously
shedding bills as he went, until he had
gone two or three blocks. When he
discovered the leak he was out \$120.

GABY EXPLAINS BASIS OF RADIAL TRAFFIC RATES

Uses Large Map of Toronto
To Illustrate His Points
To Court.

TORONTO, Sept. 29.—A huge map
that spread clear across in front of
the royal commission was the first evi-
dence that came up at the hydro radial
investigation at Ospeode Hall this af-
ternoon.

F. A. Gaby, chief engineer of the
hydro commission, explained the map,
which showed the density of population
along the line of the Toronto and East-
ern line at the Toronto end.

"There are 43,000 people in the trans-
fer and non-transfer districts, accord-
ing to our estimates," said Mr. Gaby.
"The actual count in this ward 8 dis-
trict, taken by the assessment depart-
ment, showed 40,948 persons."

The map showing density of popula-
tion indicated 23 to the acre in ward
one.

"We have similar maps for the other
municipalities that are contributory to
this line," said Mr. Gaby.

Brig-Gen. Mitchell fancied that the
estimate of 29,000 population for Osh-
awa in 1925 was a trifle high. The
1925 figure is estimated at 16,000.

"It is based on the actual increase
recently," said Mr. Gaby. "Oshawa has
been increasing by 5 1/2 per cent. Whit-
by by 5 per cent, and Bowmanville 4
per cent." He said that rural sections
did not show the same ratio of in-
crease as industrial towns.

Commissioner Hancock wanted to
know if radial roads did not tend to
increase the population along the line,
and instance how a radial line between
Detroit and Toledo, despite three steam
roads and good motor highways in
competition, was one of the best paying
radial lines in America.

"That is our information," said Mr.
Gaby.

General Mitchell then brought Mr.

Gaby back to the explanation of the
"riding habits" phrase, and the hydro
engineer went into the time zone
scheme, showing how cars downtown
made as slow speed as 2 to 3 miles an
hour, gradually increasing as they near-
ed the outskirts. He referred to the
better speed that could be made when
"the present conditions are ended and
when the street railway comes into the
city's control."

Commissioner W. A. Amos asked "Is
that a prophecy?" and the commis-
sioners smiled.

Mr. Gaby went into the method of
calculation of the traffic to be ex-
pected from the east end of Toronto.

BISHOPS BRING \$50,000 FOR ANGLICAN CHURCH IN WESTERN CANADA

MONTREAL, Sept. 29.—The stea-
ship Empress of France, delayed
fog in the river, reached Quebec
night, and on account of her late
arrival only cabin passengers were land-
ed. Among them were the bishops of
Ottawa and Worcester, who are going
to Winnipeg for the purpose of formal-
ly handing over to the church in Western
Canada the sum of \$50,000, collected
by the Archbishops' Western Canada
Fund.
