

STEAMER SINKS SCHOONER IND 18 LIVES ARE LOST

Tragedy in the Bay of Fundy-Only Two of the Crew Are Saved.

HALIFAX, May 27.-Eighteen men went to their death in the Bay of Fundy last night, when the Dominion Atlantic Railway's liner, "Boston," crashed into the Boston schooner, "Fame," and sent her to the bottom, only two of the schooner's crew being rescued. A thick fog, which enveloped the schooner's lights as if in a shroud, was the cause of the disaster.


