The following were recommended to fill some of the vacancies: Misses Martin, Gillard, Moore, Pearson, Hendry, Martin, Hewitt and Pettit.

**THREE CHURCHES IN ONE**

Plan Which Congregationalists May Try to Carry Out.

Three Congregational churches in the city are closing. Northern Church having been sold and Parkdale and Zion churches closed because they did not seem to be thriving.

"The plan on foot," said Dr. Eby, former pastor of Zion Church, "is to have a large new church erected in the northwestern part of the city, using the funds received from the closing of the three churches. I sincerely doubt whether it would flourish. There are too many Congregationalists in this city of the old school, and they are far too conservative in their ways."

Rev. Edward E. Braithwaite, pastor of Northern Church, said he did not consider the plan feasible as Parkdale was so far distant from the other two churches.

**DIES FROM INJURIES**

**Result of Chemical Explosion—How It Occurred.**

ORILLIA, July 7.—John McAuley, who was injured in the explosion of the Standard Chemical works at Longford Mills, died this morning. He was too severely hurt to be taken to the hospital here.

A. G. Feuchen, president of the Standard Chemical Co., writes The World:

"The fire at Longford Mills yesterday, we wish to state that there was no terrible explosion, and that the loss has been only \$500 on the building, \$750 on machinery and one small tank of material, valued at less than \$500. There was only one man seriously injured, and the rest are getting along nicely.

"We would also like to correct a particular item, viz., that we had not sufficient fire fighting apparatus. We have there a very large water tank of 50,000 gallons capacity, a large fire pump and our factories are equipped with the best fire fighting appliances, which were immediately brought to bear on the fire and confined same to one small tank of material.

"From investigation, we find that our workmen were charging a still with crude acetone and as it remained in the still, unknown to the workmen, a portion of a former charge, which remained hot, the contact of the cold and hot acetone formed a gas, causing the blowing off of the manhole. The gases escaped and came in contact with a portable blacksmith's forge, which was being used for some repairs just outside this building, and ignited, thus causing the fire, which returned to the building."

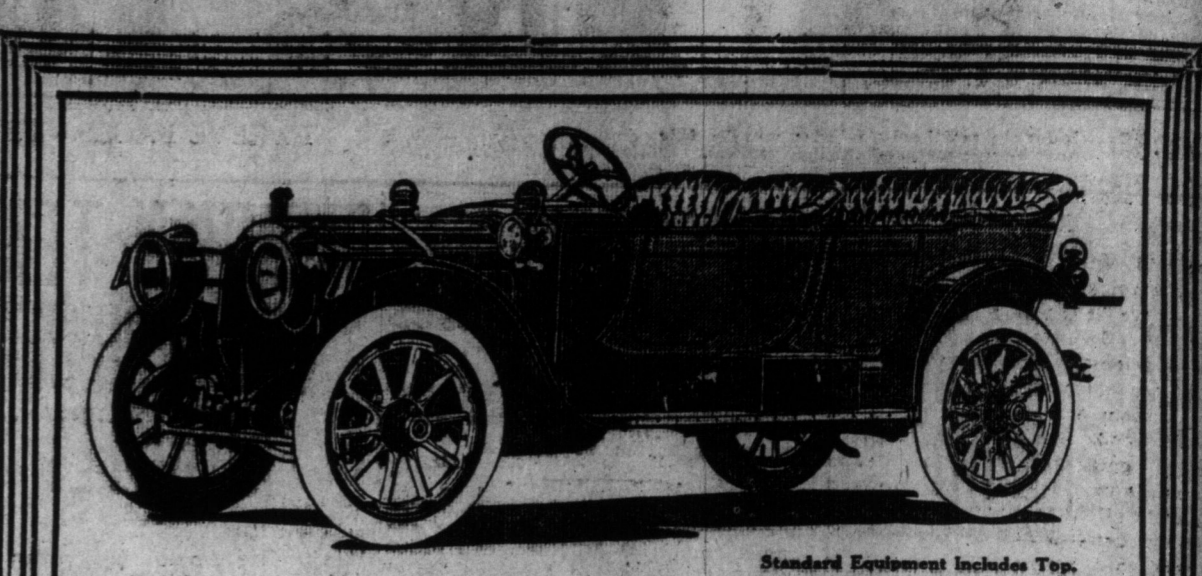
**UNIVERSITY GOVERNORS**

Six Reappointed—R. W. Leonard to Fill Vacancy.

An order in council was passed by the Ontario Cabinet yesterday reappointing the present university governors for six years. They are: Sir Edmund Walker, G. E. Cockburn, Chester D. Massey, Rev. D. Bruce Macdonald, W. T. White and E. C. Whitney. Sir Edmund Walker was reappointed chairman.

The vacancy caused by the death of Goldwin Smith has been filled by the appointment of Reuben Wells Leonard, St. Catharines, a graduate of the Royal Military College, a mining engineer, and president of the Ontario Mining Co. and of the Cobalt reduction works at St. Catharines.
