Beverly, Mass., Dec. 29.—Capt. G. B. Snowdon of the schooner Herpetia Simmons of Portland Maine, was knocked overboard by a swinging block of Baker's island today and lost.

Breunswick, Ga., Dec. 29.—The British schooner King, Capt. Morris, bound from Nova Scotia for Alexandria, Va., with a cargo of rock plaster, was put into this port yesterday in distress. She encountered a severe gale on Dec. 20, and put into Bermuda for repairs. The vessel sailed from Nova Scotia Nov. 21.

Vineyard Haven, Mass., Dec. 29.—The tug Underwriter sailed this evening for Boston, towing the disabled tug Storm King and disabled schooners Dr. J. M. Melanson and Eva May (the latter is for Portsmouth).
