instances, no doubt, has waxed cold through want of a common aim or object. It is not intended that by this means Scotchmen should assist one another to the exclusion of other nationalities, but surely the same reasons which warrant those in a city being united as we are, will warrant those of the Province being bound together for a similar object. And whilst we are glad to see those of other nationalities coming amongst us, we may be right glad for those who are our kinsfolk in addition to being fellow citizens.

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I have to thank the officers and members of the Society for their co-operation and forbearance in the discharge of the duties of my office.
