Chief Justice Barker Hands Down Decision to This Effect -Question of Judge's Right to Try a Case is Raised

This morning in Chambers, Chief Jusice Barker in the matter of the application of Mrs. L. A. Currey for leave to appeal from the decision of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick to the Supreme Court of Canada in the Currey separation suit, handed down a written judgment in which he decided that the case was not appealable. He said that if Mrs. Currey's counsel wished to take out an order in the matter he would not object.

On Tuesday afternoon, M. G. Teed, K. C., for Mrs. Currey, made the application. D. Mullin, K.C., for Dr. Currey in a lengthy argument contended that the case could not be appealed.




