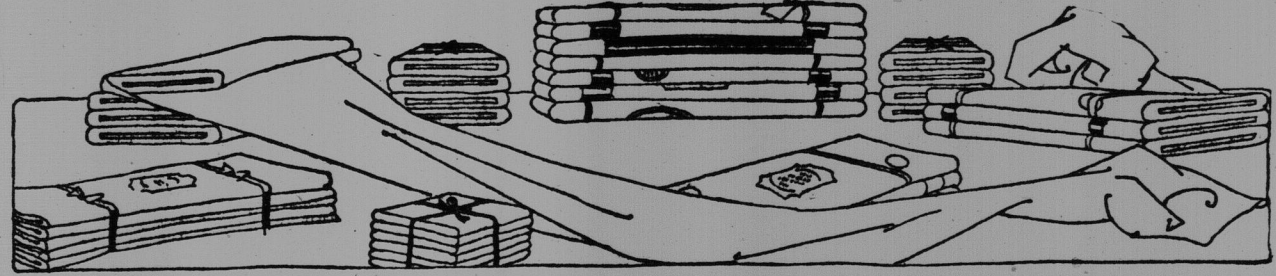

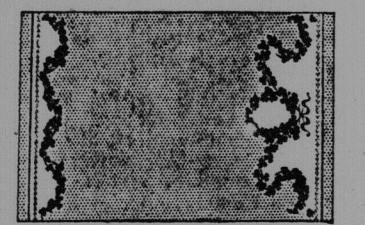

BOOST MARITIMES FOR THE TOURISTS

C. N. R. New Return Fares From Chicago, St. Louis and Vicinity.

Montreal, Jan. 12.—With the idea of inducing large numbers of tourists from the central and western states to take advantage of the excellent summer holiday facilities afforded by the Maritime Provinces, the Canadian National Railways have arranged to put in force this year new return tourist fares from Chicago, St. Louis and contiguous points to the Maritime Provinces.

These low summer tourist fares will go into effect on May 15, and will have a return limit of October 31, thus extending to all tourists from those points to the Maritime Provinces the benefit of the full tourist season. The development of these plans will be carried forward by the Canadian National Railways with an extensive and attractive advertising campaign in the newspapers and periodicals in the cities and communities affected, featuring the splendid facilities and opportunities offered by the Maritime Provinces to summer tourists. New booklets, dealing exclusively with the advantages which the Maritime Provinces have to offer from historic, scenic, sporting and other viewpoints, will be issued and circulated by the Canadian National Railways.

The Canadian National Railways are co-operating closely with the tourist association in the Maritime Provinces, with the view to increasing the volume of this desirable trade from western territory to the Maritime Provinces.

DEATHS

Rev. Dr. Robert Jardine.

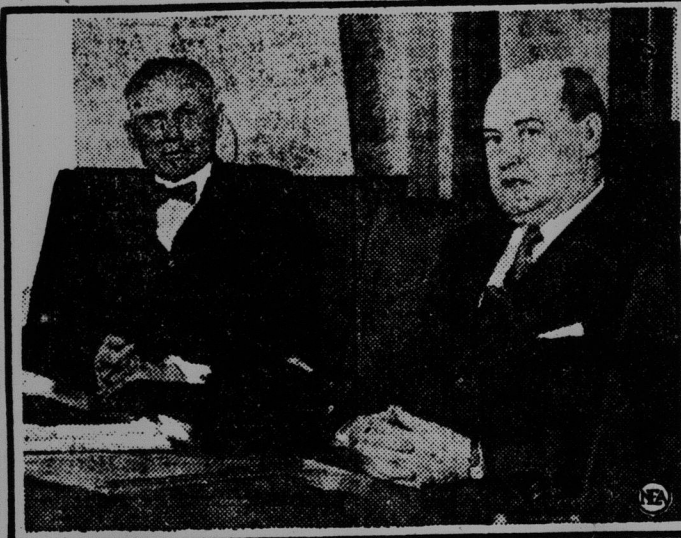
Brookville, Ont., Jan. 11.—Word received here today told of the death in New York City of Rev. Dr. Robert Jardine, former prominent member of the Presbyterian church in Canada, at the age of 84. He was one time Professor of English Literature and philosophy at the University of New Brunswick, a position which he left to enter educational work at Bombay, India.

In that country he became ultimately principal of the General Assembly's college at Calcutta. In 1879 he accepted a call to St. Andrew's church, Chatham, N. B., and afterwards was pastor of St. John's, Brookville, and St. Paul's, Prince Albert, Sask. In 1888 he withdrew from the Presbyterian church through doctrinal differences and became pastor of the Church of Our Father, Chicago, affiliated with the American Congress of Liberal Religious Societies. Three sons and two daughters survive.

Thomas Gillard.
