IMMIGRATION NEEDED.
The Royal Bank Bulletin sounds the following hopeful note with regard to Canada's outlook for recovery from business depression:

"Although, for Europe, recovery necessarily will be a slow process, it does not follow that it must be so for Canada. On the contrary, it will be rapid, provided that immigration comes back to the figures of 1913, when over 400,000 new settlers entered this country. At that time, instead of having to look for them abroad, Canadian business men had between three and four hundred thousand fresh customers brought to their doors each year. The most recent figures of the Department of Immigration show that the total fell to 146,000 in the year ending November 30, 1920, and still further, to 104,000, in 1921. It is to be hoped that this marked the low point, and that from the spring of 1922 on, circumstances will permit of a constant increase in the number of desirable new settlers coming to this country. These immigrants would bring with them cash to a very large aggregate. They would develop our resources, increase our production and ensure better business for the whole country."

ST. JOHN AND PORTLAND THE TWO GRAIN PORTS
(Montreal Gazette.)
A fairly active business was done in ocean grain from West St. John and Portland during the past week, there being a steady demand from both local and outside exporters, and especially so for continental freight, which had created a stronger feeling in the market, and rates have scored another advance of one cent per 100 lbs., with engagements of heavy grain to Hamburg at 17c per 100 lbs., and light grain at 27c per 100 lbs., while room to Antwerp and Rotterdam for heavy grain was let at 16c per 100 lbs., and light grain at 26c per 100 lbs. for February shipment. All the freight available to Dublin and Belfast for February shipment has been engaged at 38, 60, per quarter for heavy, and at 38, 80, for oats, with March now offering at an advance of 3d, per quarter at 38, 9d, for heavy grain, and at 38, 6d, for oats. A large portion of the room to other United Kingdom ports has also booked up for February shipment at 38, 3d per quarter for heavy grain, and at 38 for oats.

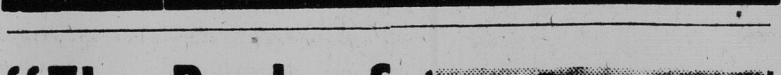
