WORLD GOLD OUTPUT

LESSENS £5,000,000

Production Last Year 15,502,808 Ounces, Valued at £85,886,025, British Estimate.

A decline of more than 1,000,000 ounces in the world's production of gold in 1921, compared with the output in 1920, is indicated by British estimates received by the Bankers Trust Company. The estimated total production was 15,502,808 ounces, against 16,561,158 ounces in 1920.

The value of the gold produced last year is estimated at £85,886,025, less than the value of that produced in 1920. The 1920 value was about £90,000,000 below the value of the production in 1919. The values are given as 255,886,225 in 1921, 270,884,921 in 1920, 275,850,187 in 1919.

Production estimates for 1921 show a decrease of more than 7,000,000 ounces, compared with the output in 1919, when the high water mark was reached. Increased cost of gold mining, unaccompanied by a corresponding increase in the value of the metal, is the accepted explanation of the recent steady decline in the world's gold production.

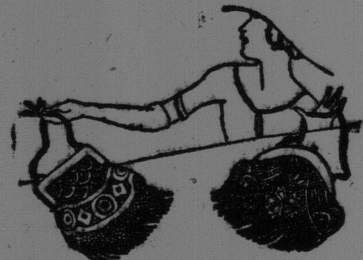

NOVA SCOTIAN MAY BE CHOSEN THE NEXT MANITOBA PREMIER

A Winnipeg despatch to the Halifax Chronicle says:—"A Nova Scotian may become premier of Manitoba. A definite movement is on foot in the ranks of the United Farmers of Manitoba looking to the selection of George Chipman, editor of the Grain Growers Guide as provincial leader of the United Farmers Party in the coming election. Mr. Chipman came west fifteen years ago from the Orchard district of Nova Scotia where his father and mother still live. He first entered journalism in 1912. "Should Mr. Chipman favor the proposal and decide to accept, the rank and file of the U. F. M. feel assured that he will be the next prime minister of Manitoba. Mr. Chipman has no special ambition to enter politics, but it is general comment in local agrarian circles that he entertains the idea that, if he should decide to take hold under pressure being exerted upon him, evidence should be given that the party is not out to set the

country against the urban centres; and that to this end a tentative cabinet should be chosen, to include two Winnipeg men, one as attorney general and another as provincial treasurer.

"Mr. Chipman as editor of the Grain Growers Guide, has been a figure at every convention of farmers held in Manitoba, and is well known throughout the province as an able platform speaker."

Rev. R. Moorhead Legate has been invited to give the baccalaureate sermon to the graduating class at the convocation of the University of New Brunswick in

Fredericton on May 14 and has accepted the invitation. Mr. Legate's eldest son is a student at the U. N. B. and this year finishes his second year in the engineering course.
