Where there are thousands of individuals handicapped in the race of life by physical defects, many of them remediable, and all of them avoidable if ignorance of ceuses can be done away with, there will be found a nation that cannot rise to its full stature of national manhood and intelligence. Nova Scotia is seeing one of the fruits of that new determination to change conditions, in the sending out of the health caravans which will carry doctors, nurses and supplies both medical, surgical and dental into sections remote from much accessories to public health. Many a child grows up in ignorance or suffers from the unjust accusation of stupidity, delinquency or even feeble mindedness, when he is simply nearly blind, nearly deaf or suffering from adenoids and enlarged tonsils. The "caravans" will provide for examination, free advice, free treatment for children or adults suffering from these and other physical defects and ailments which prevent them becoming wholly efficient members of the body politic. A new gospel of health will be preached to the people in all parts of the province, and moving picture films will be silent, effective preachers to support and sustain, and in many cases to make possible, the work of physicians and nurses.

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
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
