Hon. Philippe Roy, agent-general in Paris for the government of Quebec, is celebrating his forty-sixth birthday today in the French capital. Doctor Roy has the distinction of being the youngest Canadian ever appointed to the 'dominion senate, having achieved that rank when only thirty-eight. A native of Quebec and a doctor by profession, he settled in Edmonton as a young man, and there practised medicine for some years. He eventually became interested in bringing French capital into Canada and because of his success in this work was appointed agent general of the dominion in Paris, when the office became vacant in 1911. He had previously been called to the senate by Earl Grey. PUT-BAN ON TANGO AS SOME IN CALAIS DANCE I

Calais, Feb. 18—Acting on the report of Deputy Marshal Albert Greenlaw, who was directed by the city council at its January meeting to make a round of the public dances and report as to whether or not, in his opinion, the tango was objectionable, that body, at its regular meeting this week voted to notify all proprietors of dance halls and managers of social affairs that they would be held strictly accountable if any one indulged in dancing suggestive or independent. Have you a watch from

indulged in dancing suggestive or indecent. In his report Marshal Greenlaw said he visited the hall in Milltown several times but saw nothing objectionable, the tango having been prohibited there by the management. He could not say so much for the Grange hall dances, which he also visited several times. This is what his report says of these functions: "While there I witnessed the performance of the tango dance, which, as performed by the dancers of these occasons was, in my opinion, a highly suggestive and improper dance, and one which ought to be prohimited. The lance, as performed on several occasions when I was present, was what might ustly be characterized as indecent. "I find that the dance is not acceptable to a majority of those who attend hese public dances, and that it is performed by comparatively few persons." The members of the board did not ondemn the tango, when danced in a roper manner, but decided to make he managers interested in seeing that it was danced that way.




