CHILD'S PROTECTION ACT.

GOOD RESULTS FOR THE TUBERCULIN TREATMENT

Annual Report of Royal Edward Institute in Montreal

(Montreal Gazette) The fourth annual report of the Royal Edward Institute, which has just been issued, contains much interesting and important information about the work being done by this institution for the study, prevention and cure of tuberculosis. Much of the material found in the report was published at the time of the annual meeting in November of last year, but to those interested in the welfare of the public, the report will be welcome for the completeness and compactness of the information which it contains.

As Better at Work "At first the treatment was to keep the patients as much as possible at rest, in accordance with sanatorium methods, and to limit the exercise as much as possible," says Doctor Harding. "During the last year the method has been changed, and the exercise of the patient is increased as rapidly as possible as long as the temperature remains under treatment being able to take four to five hours' exercise walking without any appreciable effect on the condition of the patient, he is advised to get some suitable work preferably something out-of-doors, but if not, an effort is made to get him back to his own trade. In the case of girls, they are advised to begin housework in the same way. The results with these working have been very satisfactory, as only in one or two instances has the work had to be stopped. The reason of the good results is that mentally and physically a man is healthier speaking than when lying. The laboring classes are not adapted for a long rest treatment at a sanatorium and give very poor results. I believe that much better results can be obtained under dispensary and tuberculin treatment. The ideal condition for such patients would be sleeping camps on the outskirts of the city, where the patients could spend the nights in a suitable atmosphere, and return to work in the morning. The tabulated statement appended by Doctor Harding shows that twenty-four cases were in first stage of the disease, sixteen cases in the second stage and ten in the third stage. Of the twenty-four patients in the first stage, the disease had apparently been arrested and the patients were working, one case was reported as improved, another as not improved, one patient had died, and four were still under treatment. Of the sixteen patients in the second stage, the disease had been arrested in one, three showed improvement, two showed no improvement, one died and nine remained under treatment. Of the ten cases in the most advanced stage, the results were of course less marked, one being improved, two showing no improvement, three dying and four being still under treatment.

WORDS OF CHEER

Perhaps he will take another occasion to express his views on that point, and also with regard to the St. John Valley Railway, and other matters which are just now of greater interest to the people of this city and province than the Gutelius-Stanton report, which even his friend the St. John Globe has described as a campaign document whose chief service was to provide two gentlemen with a lucrative job.

SUCCESS DOUBTFUL

Collapse of Railroad Men's Strike in Italy Indicated. Rome, Italy, April 12—That section of the Italian roadmen which hitherto has been irreconcilable on the question of the men's demands, appears to be beginning to harbor doubt as to the success of the general strike which it was proposed to start on next Wednesday according to information obtained in official quarters. It is understood that an indirect effort has been made by some of the leaders to open negotiations with the government to obtain even a slight increase in the concessions offered by the government, so as to enable the strike leaders to cover their retreat.
