News of the Boxers.

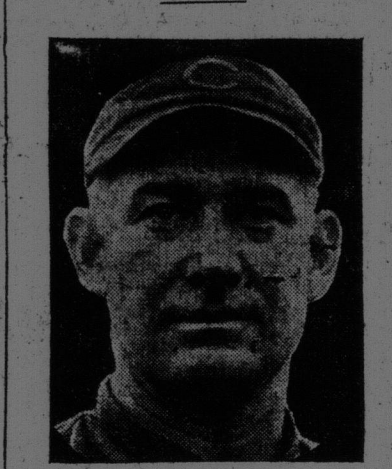
