FULL APPRAISAL OF ASTOR ESTATE

Gross Value Has Been Fixed at \$87,218,791

LARGE INHERITANCE TAX
Statement of the Astor Jewelry Included—Sunburst Worth \$78,000; Necklace, \$60,000; and Earrings \$12,000—On Honeymoon Bought Gems Worth \$70,000

John V. Cogger, the inheritance tax appraiser has recently affixed his signature to the completed appraisal of the estate of Col. John Jacob Astor, who perished on April 15, 1912, in the wreck of the Titanic. The appraisal fixes the gross value of Colonel Astor's estate at \$87,218,791.05, of which \$68,124,821 was real estate and \$19,093,970.05 was personal property. The appraiser's figures indicate that the net estate is \$65,311,228.95.

The report shows that the \$787,897.35 trust fund created as the anti-nuptial endowment of Mrs. Ava Willing Astor, Col. Astor's first wife, is taxed as a direct legacy to William Vincent Astor, her son. The reason for this, it appears, was that the trust was for Col. Astor's life, or during her widowhood. She was not his widow, however, in the eyes of the law, when he died, as he left a second wife, Mrs. Madeline Talmage Force Astor.

Col. Astor held at the time of his death, the report shows, a claim of \$110,080 against Charles W. Morse, arising from a guarantee by Morse to hold Colonel Astor free from liability on stock of a telephone company during its transfer. Morse was in the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary when Colonel Astor died.

\$3,150,000 Paid on Tax
Colonel Astor's estate paid on October 11, 1912, the sum of \$3,150,000 into the state treasury as an installment on the inheritance tax due on his estate. This is the largest payment ever made in this or any other state as an inheritance tax. The payment was made to secure the rebate of 5 per cent allowed for payment of the tax within six months after death.

Whether this preliminary payment of tax will cover the amount of tax to be fixed by the courts will depend on the outcome of an appeal by the State Controller now pending in the Court of Appeals. The state's position is that it is entitled to have it held that an entirely new method of computation of tax was provided by the amendment of the inheritance tax law of 1911, and, if he succeeds, some hundreds of thousands of dollars will be added to the tax. The Surrogate will be compelled to fix the tax under the present precedents, and an appeal will be taken as a matter of form as soon as the taxing order is entered.

Mrs. Madeline Talmage Force Astor's anti-nuptial fund of \$810,000 is not taxable since it was made over to her outright with power of disposition during Colonel Astor's life. The larger trust fund it was calculated that she had a taxable interest of \$1,094,199, and that Vincent Astor's interest, based on his expectation of outliving her, was \$264,040. Her interest in her life estate is \$5,000,000, left to her by Colonel Astor's will and her death, and her interest was estimated to be worth \$969,145, and Vincent Astor's interest therein was estimated at \$692,712. The value of her life estate in the property at 840 Fifth Avenue was estimated at \$1,974,670. The property is valued at \$2,475,000, with a remainder interest to Vincent Astor of \$476,546. In the contents of the house valued at \$629,409, her life estate was calculated to be worth \$502,201, and Vincent Astor's remainder interest \$121,198.

A Remarkable Appraisal
One of the remarkable documents in the report of the report of Robert E. Dowling, who appraised the down-town Broadway, and Fifth Avenue property of the estate. This is heavily bound, and contains a complete description of every feature of the land and buildings appraised.

Representatives of the Astor estate said that while the estate had always kept complete accounts of all the estate's property, no such detailed account of it had ever been put together as the appraisal by the four experts who prepared the tables of the Manhattan and Bronx property.

Among the interesting items in the report were statements concerning the Astor jewelry. It appeared that Colonel Astor, when he went on his honeymoon trip in the fall of 1911, bought his wife jewelry from Cartier in Paris to the value of \$69,772. This was not paid for at the time and was listed among the debts of his estate, as was explained in hearings before Appraiser Cogger by Nicholas Biddle, Colonel Astor's business agent and one of the executors of his will. The other Astor jewelry, most of which was held at the offices of the estate, was appraised at \$161,229. The principal items were a diamond sunburst \$78,000, a necklace of diamonds, \$86,000, and diamond earrings worth \$12,000.

**DUKE OF NORFOLK'S
FORTUNE; OWNS VAST
TRACTS OF LAND**

Estimated He is Worth \$20,000,000—Owner of Three London Streets

Although the Duke of Norfolk's holdings of land are not to be compared in extent with those of the dukes of Sutherland and Buccleuch, they are among the most valuable in the United Kingdom. Included in the 49,866 acres which he possesses are three whole streets in London, Arundel, Surrey and Norfolk. As these thoroughfares are in the heart of the metropolis, their value is enormous. Other tremendously valuable acres of the duke are in Sussex, Derbyshire and York counties. Like other dukes, His Grace of Norfolk has been greatly disturbed over Lloyd George's land tax and he created a world-wide sensation not long ago by offering for sale an almost priceless painting by Holbein, which had been loaned for many years by the family to the National Gallery. His wealth is estimated as at least \$20,000,000.

In many ways the Duke of Norfolk is one of the most distinguished of the British nobility. He is a devoted Catholic and in 1887 served as a special envoy to the Pope. He is the premier duke of Great Britain, and as earl marshal held a conspicuous place at the coronations of Edward VII. and George V.

No other of the twenty-six dukes now living in Great Britain goes so far back as that of Norfolk, which was

created in 1488. Long before that the Howard family, of which the present duke is a descendant, was powerful in England, and held large acreages of land, acquired through royal grants or by marriages to heiresses.

The first Earl of Norfolk was a certain Ralph de Guader, who crossed to England with William the Conqueror, and who forfeited his estates when he revolted against the king in 1073. The family of Bigod held the earldom until 1332, when a younger son of Edward I. was made sixth earl. His granddaughter was created Duchess of Norfolk in 1397. Thomas Mowbray, the first duke, was given the great estates of the Earl of Arundel when he fled that nobleman's conspiracy against the king. When he died in 1399 he left land to his descendants in nearly every English county. His last months are commemorated in Shakespeare's "Richard III."

Between his accession to the title and 1488 the dukedom became twice extinct. In 1488 the Howard family first came into possession of the title, which is held to date from this year. John Howard, the first duke of this line, was so created by Richard III. and was a relative by marriage of the family which had previously held the dukedom.

The third duke of the Howard family was a considerable figure in English history. He led the van of the British army at the battle of Flodden and was a bitter opponent of Cardinal Wolsey. Two of his nieces, Anne Boleyn and Catherine Howard, were successively married to Henry VIII. and beheaded by that capricious monarch. The fourth duke was a supporter of Mary, Queen of Scots. At one time it was confidently believed that he would marry Mary, but he was arrested by Elizabeth and beheaded. The dukedom was lost by attainder, but was restored in 1660.

The present holder of the title was born in 1847 and succeeded his father in 1900. He was postmaster-general of Great Britain from 1885 to 1900, was the first lord mayor of Sheffield, and

set a conspicuous example to the nobility by going to the front in the Boer war. His only son by his first marriage died, and his heir, the Earl Arundel, is the issue of a second marriage. The future wielder of the great title outside of royalty in Great Britain is but five years of age. He will inherit not only nearly 50,000 acres of land, but four lordly palaces, Norfolk House in London, Arundel Castle in Sussex, and Derwent Hall in Derbyshire and Be Hill in Sheffield.
