CARDINAL O'CONNELL IS EXPECTED NEXT MONDAY ON STEAMER CANOPIC

Boston Plans for a Hearty Welcome, Including Procession to His Home

Boston, Jan. 23.—Arrangements have been made so that Cardinal O'Connell will arrive next Monday from Rome, be transferred from the steamship Canopic to a harbor boat and be brought to Long Wharf. He will be welcomed there by Mayor Fitzgerald and a reception committee.

With the arrival of the cardinal, the 9th Regiment, under command of Col. John J. Sullivan, the chief auxiliary to the regiment under the charge of James J. Fieland, the chairman of the committee on parade, and the other organizations that participate, will form a procession and start for the archbishop's house in Granby street.

The parade will start at the corner of Atlantic avenue and State street, and march by way of State street, Court street, Tremont street, Boylston street, Arlington street to Commonwealth avenue and Sag State road to Granby street. It is expected that between 20,000 and 25,000 people will gather along the streets over which the procession will pass, to welcome the cardinal. The decorations for the most part will probably be of American flag, cardinal red and the papal colors. The Canopic is expected in the harbor next Monday. According to cablegrams from Gibraltar and the Azores, the queen liner is running on her schedule time. When the Canopic reaches, quarantine, Cardinal O'Connell will be greeted by Bishop Anderson, the head of the committee of arrangements, and by a few who have been assisting the bishop.

This party of half a dozen will go down the harbor on the Westminster, but no ceremony will be given the cardinal. The cardinal and his party will then be placed on board the Monitor. On the Monitor formal speeches of welcome by the reception committee will be made and the cardinal will probably say a few words in return. The Monitor will head straight for Long Wharf, where it is then planned that Mayor Fitzgerald on behalf of the city will welcome the cardinal home again and after the cardinal has replied, the escort will be ready to move.
