The satisfaction of the king with the manner in which the metropolitan police force carried out their duties has been expressed by the following letter communicated to the commissioner by the home secretary.

The king desires me to express to the commissioner and all the members of the metropolitan police his entire satisfaction with the very efficient manner in which the arrangements for the coronation have been carried out.

In addition to this the home secretary has informed the commissioner that His Majesty has been pleased to approve of the issue of a medal to all ranks of the metropolitan police service on June 22.
