COME TO CANADA TO SEE CHILDREN

Parents Meet F. J. Donegani
Here After Seventeen
Years Separation.

Separated for 17 years, F. J. Donegani and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Donegani, of Matlock Bath, England, were united once more on the arrival of the Canadian Pacific liner Montclair from Liverpool on Saturday. One of the first things that Mr. Donegani said to his son was to express regret that they had not arrived earlier in the season so that they might have seen what a St. John winter was like. Scarcely were the words out of his mouth when it began to snow. Mr. Donegani last night said his father was perfectly satisfied with the sample of Canadian winter given Saturday afternoon and evening. Mr. Donegani, who is 74 years of age, and his wife, who is just 70, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary only a couple of weeks ago, and on the occasion decided to visit their four sons living in Canada. In addition to F. J. Donegani, who is manager of the Pacific Dairies here, the sons are H. G., chief of catering department of the C. P. R. Steamships, Ltd., Montreal; E. G., a director of Simmons Beds, Ltd., Montreal; and D. T., in Hamilton, Ont. A fifth son holds an important government position in Egypt.

During the recent election in England Mr. Donegani was secretary to Lord Hartington, son of the Duke of Devonshire, who was the Conservative candidate in Matlock Bath. Lord Hartington was elected. Mr. and Mrs. Donegani are in the best of health, and greatly enjoyed the voyage across the Atlantic. After visiting their son here at his home in Cedar Grove Crescent, they will spend some time with their sons in Montreal and Hamilton, and return to their home in England in September.

KONGSHAVN IS TO BE REPAIRED

Owner is Here from Norway
Superintending Plans for
Movements.

The Norwegian steamer M. H. Kongshavn, which has been tied up in Rodney Slip during the winter, will be repaired here, either in Market Slip or the East St. John dry dock and will proceed under her own steam to her home port, Haugesund, Norway, when fit for sea, according to the owner, Antoni Omundsen of Haugesund, who is here superintending arrangements for her departure.

Captain Omundsen, who is a comparatively young man, says he has not definitely decided whether repairs will be made, but he expects the work will not occupy more than one month. He says he is bringing some men out from Norway for a crew and will take on a few men here.

It will be recalled that the steamer which holds the honor of being the first to go into the East St. John dry dock on the memorable opening day last October, grounded on the southwest ledge of Briar Island on October 25, while on her way here from Philadelphia to load potatoes for Havana. She managed to limp into port and later was taken into the dry dock. The dry dock people received no word for several days from Norway regarding repairs and later the ship was advertised for auction, but withdrawn owing to the smallness of bids. She then was towed to West St. John.

The Kongshavn was built in Japan, five years ago, and for three years was engaged in European trade, later on going into the potato trade. She is 2,000 tons gross.

EASTER BRIDES

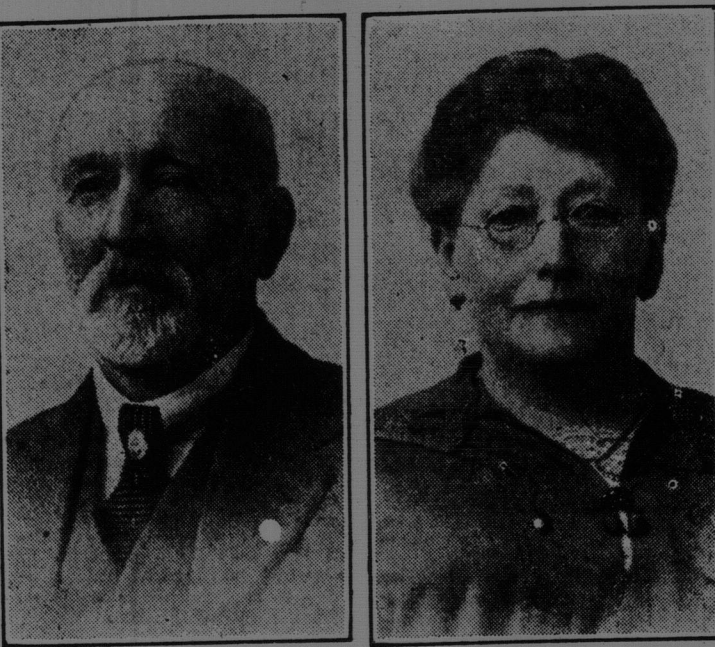
