Fredericton, N. B., July 10.—The local market for strawberries reached retail price of ten cents a box here today, which is as low as has been reached since the beginning of the war. It is probable that the price will 50 lower as no shipping to Montreal has been attempted yet. It was expected to ship on Monday but advices from Montreal are that the Ontario fruit is still on the market there and has gluthed it.


