Wires Are Crippled.

Chicago, Dec. 29.—Telephone and telegraph companies reported early yesterday that weather conditions threaten a serious crippling of service in the Middle West, with a possibility that Chicago may be cut off from direct communication both east and west.

A wet heavy snow storm originating in the West traveled eastward all night and interfered with the transmission of messages of nearly all trunk lines. Rain, gradually turning to snow, in Indiana, caused serious wire delay there. This necessitated the re-routing of much telegraphic matter.

If the weather turns colder soon it is feared that a general prostration of wire service may result.

Alarming Increase in Insanity.

New York, Dec. 29.—At the first public meeting in the campaign for the prevention of lunacy, held in the Academy of Medicine, Dr. C. C. Warren, president of the New York State Commission in Lunacy, declared that one out of every 279 persons in this state is downright insane. He said, further, that while the increase in population since 1890 had been 47.6 per cent., the increase in the number of crazy persons had been 103.9 per cent.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson II.—First Quarter, For Jan. 8, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, I Kings xii, 25, to xiii, 6.—Memory Verses, 28-30.—Golden Text, Ex. xx, 4.—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

All the predictions and foreshadowings of Scripture and their fulfillments should be of the greatest possible interest to every child of God, and before we leave the story of Rehoboam we should notice that in the fifth year of his reign, or just about thirty-four years after the temple was completed, it was plundered by Shishak, king of Egypt. Compare I Kings vi, 38, and II Chron. xii, 2, 9. In John ii, 19-21, the Lord Jesus spoke of Himself as the temple and of His death and resurrection, and He must have been about thirty-four years of age when He was crucified.

In the lesson of today we are introduced to Jeroboam, son of Nebat, the first king of the ten tribes, and afterward spoken of over twenty times as the man who made Israel to sin, and this he did deliberately, although he had been told that the kingdom had been divided and part of it given to him because of this very sin of idolatry on the part of Solomon (chapter xi, 31-38). He had also been told that if he would do right in the sight of the Lord the Lord would be with him and build him a sure house.

He seems, however, to have had no confidence in the assurance of the Lord, but was afraid that if the people went to Jerusalem to offer sacrifice in the house of the Lord the kingdom would return to the house of David. So he took counsel and made two calves of gold, placing one in Bethel and one in Dan, for the people to worship and said, "Behold thy gods, O Israel, which brought thee up out of the land of Egypt" (verse 28). There is an evil one, the devil, who hates the living and true God and His word and His people and ever seeks to have people worship him instead of God. Whatever is not the worship of God is the worship of the devil and of demons, and all idolatry is of the devil (Deut. xxxii, 16, 17; I Cor. x, 20; Ps. cvi, 35-37). The great deceiver and enemy of God and man sought to have even the Son of God worship him and to that end offered him all the kingdoms of the world and the glory of them (Matt. iv, 8-10). He will ere this age close, but after the church has been caught away, possess a man whom all the world will worship except those whose names are in the book of life (Rev. xiii, 4-8). This Jeroboam and all others from Cain onward to the antichrist of the last days, who do not believe God and therefore do believe the devil, are all one family and on their way to the place prepared for the devil and his angels (Matt. xxv, 41).

In verse 28 we read that the king took counsel, but it was certainly not of God, reminding us of Isa. xxx, 1, 2; viii, 9, 10, for it is only the counsel of the Lord that stands (Ps. xxxiii, 10, 11). The whole thing was a device of his own heart, like the false prophets of Jer. xxiii, 16, 26, whom the Lord did not send, and therefore the devil did. Three of the places mentioned in our lesson were places of the greatest possible interest to a child of God, and if Jeroboam had been such he could not but have profited greatly by the recollection of what had happened there. Two of them, Shechem and Bethel, would have reminded him of an altar unto the Lord and of the Lord's appearing to Abraham and to Jacob (Gen. xii and xxviii). At Peniel or Peniel the Lord wrestled with Jacob, humbled him and gave him his new name of Israel, and Jacob said, "I have seen God face to face" (Gen. xxxii, 30). At Shechem Joshua delivered his farewell address to Israel, which might have done Jeroboam good if he could have read it, for he greatly needed such words.

There also the body of Joseph was buried, which the children of Israel brought out of Egypt (Josh. xxiv). And there the Lord Jesus sat on Jacob's well and saved the woman of Samaria (John iv) and afterward many others. Dan was the northern boundary of the land, and Bethel was in the south of the ten tribes, so that Jeroboam might be said to have filled the land with idolatry from north to south. How fearful and horrible! (Jer. v, 30, 31.) The prophet Ahijah was commissioned to tell Jeroboam by the mouth of his wife that because of his sin the Lord would root up Israel out of the land and scatter them beyond the river (chapter xiv, 12-16). If an expression can be a key to a chapter, then chapter xiii is the greatest "man of God" chapter in the Bible, for the title is found there fifteen times, though the name of the man of God is not given.

It is a marvelous record and a most solemn warning not to believe even an angel nor a prophet, however venerable, if his testimony is contrary to the word of God. It may be that the Apostle Paul had it in mind when he, by the Spirit, wrote Gal. i, 8. In chapter xiii, 2, we have Josiah, the king, mentioned by name about 300 years before he was born, and the fulfillment of this prediction concerning him is recorded in II Kings xxiii, 15-17. May this prediction and fulfillment strengthen us to believe firmly that every prediction in Scripture shall be as literally fulfilled. Read carefully this wonderful chapter.

BRIEFS FROM THE WIRES.

To men over 100 years old died in Ontario.

The relations between President Taft and Mr. Roosevelt are said to be very friendly.

United States Steel Corporation reported to be purchasing land near Dunnville.

The output of the Scotch distilleries has decreased by over two million gallons during the past year.

Railway companies will disregard the Quebec dual language bill intended to govern the issue of all tickets, railway forms and literature.

Ten large engines for the C.N.R. are to be built at the Canadian Locomotive Works at Kingston, the contract having just been signed.

The Island of Gomera, in the Canary group, has been devastated by a terrible tornado, which cost 150 lives and wrecked scores of villages.

Mrs. Clarke, sister of Mrs. Pankhurst and a prominent British suffragette, has died after leaving prison, where, the suffragettes allege, she was harshly treated.

A cablegram to his family at Niagara Falls yesterday stated that N. B. Colbeck, Ontario Trade Commissioner in London, is in a critical condition, suffering from pleuro-pneumonia. His son, Bert, has left for England.

Mount Etna in Sicily continues to emit flames and smoke, but no lava.

The people, who for a time were wrought up over the possibility of a disaster, are now tranquil, and it is believed that the volcano will soon subside.

James Coburn, a well known resident of North Crosby, Ont., is alleged to have stabbed his son-in-law, a young man named Gibson, four times, after the latter had taken him home drunk. One of the wounds is within half an inch of the heart.

Contemplate Reductions.

Brockville, Dec. 29.—Under municipal management the Brockville waterworks department has closed the best year in its history. The revenue from all sources realized are \$34,599.68. Of this amount \$30,853.94 was collected from consumers, being an increase of \$1,000 over last year. After meeting operating expenses, writing off \$2,000 for depreciation in plant, giving a grant of \$12,000 to the corporation for street repairs, and liquidating the debt by \$9,297, the statement shows a surplus of \$9,771.

In the past eighteen years the net surplus was \$43,349. Of this amount \$35,642 was spent on extensions and improvements. The commissioners are considering a further reduction in rates to domestic consumers.

A Fateful Feast.

New York, Dec. 29.—A man and a woman are dead and two other men are seriously ill in hospitals as a result of drinking liquor said to have contained wood alcohol at a lower western Christmas celebration on Monday night. The dead are Mrs. Maria Del Giudice, 22 years old, and Rocco De Marco. The condition of the other two men is said to be serious.

All attended a Christmas feast for which the host had laid in a large store of wine of which he partly drank freely. Soon afterward the four members of the company were taken violently ill. Mrs. Giudice died Tuesday night and De Marco early yesterday.

Connaught May Come.

London, Dec. 29.—(C.A.P. Cable.)—The Canadian Associated Press has reason to believe that the whole question of the Duke of Connaught and the governorship of Canada is still under consideration, though no definite decision has yet been taken. When the duke arrived in London, he received no intimation of any change in plans as has been reported from Ottawa. He returned to England in expectation of proceeding to Canada as soon as he can be spared after the coronation.

Children Burned to Death.

Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 29.—Little four-year-old Myrtle Shotts and her baby sister were burned to death yesterday. Their mother had gone to a nearby grocery store and left the children in the kitchen. The fire door of the coal range was open and a piece of partially burned paper gave silent testimony.

Victims Out of Danger.

Dresden, Dec. 29.—Walter Dynes, Dr. McDonald, Robt. Aiken and Chas. Aiken, the men injured by the explosion during the recent fire, are all pronounced out of danger.

Rev. George Long, who died from his injuries, was buried yesterday afternoon at two o'clock. Dr. V. H. H. Aiken will take place this afternoon. The inquest is adjourned until next week.

First Bye-Election.

London, Dec. 29.—The death of the Earl of Leicester creates the first vacancy in the newly-elected Parliament. The fight for the seat, which will be as soon as Lord Ancester's funeral is over, will be watched with great interest. It is probable that Mr. Bonar Law, the defeated candidate of Manchester, may be the Unionist champion.

The King's Effigy.

Ottawa, Dec. 29.—The Finance Department is awaiting the approval by King George V. of his effigy to be used on the Canadian gold coins. As soon as they are done, and the dies are forwarded, the coinage of gold will begin at the Ottawa branch of the royal mint. This will likely be next month.

An Infantry School of Instruction.

A palace hotel is said to be projected for Winnipeg.

The body found in Detroit is not that of Dolphine Drouillard, of Sandwich.

The Canadian General Electric Co. will build a new \$100,000 power house at Auburn.

ENTERTAINS FRIENDS

Hon. W. L. M. King Dines Water-loo Reform Executive.

HE REVIEWS YEAR'S WORK

Asks His Hearers to Remember the Difference Between the Phrases "Canada's Navy" and the "Canadian Naval Service"—Tariff Depends on What U.S. Has to Offer in Coming Conference.

Berlin, Dec. 28.—The Minister of Labor gave a Christmas dinner at the Walper House here yesterday to the members of the executive of the Reform Association of North Waterloo, and made it an occasion to present a review of the work of the Government since the similar event held here a year ago.

Speaking of the recent deputation of farmers to Ottawa, Mr. King said he hoped the Government would find it possible to advance the welfare of the farmers without injuring other interests, because upon the well-being of the farmers rested the prosperity of the whole country.

As to the trade negotiations with the United States, much depended upon what they had to offer. Canada was prepared to meet them on fair ground for the equal benefit of both countries, but always with the stipulation that Canada's preference to Britain must remain intact.

Respecting the naval question, Mr. King distinguished between the terms "Canadian navy," and the proper one of "The Canadian naval service." The Government's idea was rather to police Canada's coasts, and place the warships at Britain's disposal, should need arise, than to maintain an aggressive navy.

Following this meeting Mr. King addressed the Women's Canadian Club of Berlin and Waterloo on the work of the Department of Labor, and its bearing upon the conditions of women and children.

Dying Man Immersed in Ice Water.

North Bay, Dec. 28.—Henry Stokes, a young Englishman, was brought to North Bay Hospital from a lumber camp across Lake Nipissing, suffering with typhoid fever. The journey out was a hard one, with many miles of walking and the sick man was immersed in water several times, breaking through the ice. His condition rapidly grew worse until death resulted. He had no friends in this country, and will be buried at North Bay, under the auspices of the Sons of England.

Fire Burned Centre of Block.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—Fire last night burned a hole in the centre of the block bounded by St. Peter, Notre Dame, St. Helen and Recollet streets, doing damage estimated at about \$200,000. The fire started in the premises of the Anglo-Canadian Leather Co. on Recollet street, and burned its way through the block to Notre Dame street, spreading along Recollet street into the rear of the dry-goods house of W. R. Brock & Co., where considerable damage was done by water.

An Anarchist Arsenal.

London, Dec. 28.—According to The Daily Telegraph, the search by the police for the Houndsditch burglars, who shot several policemen to death a few nights ago, has led to the discovery of a complete anarchist arsenal in the house in Gold street, Stepney, formerly occupied by the dead burglar, Gardesin. In this house the police found large quantities of materials used in the manufacture of explosives, anarchist literature, weapons of various kinds and dum-dum bullets.

A Small Revolution.

Tsing Tsu, China, Dec. 28.—The German cruiser Emden sailed yesterday for Ponape, Caroline Islands, where an inspection has occurred.

Berlin, Dec. 28.—The Colonial Office yesterday received a message from the German governor of the Caroline Islands reporting his arrival at Ponape with 160 soldiers. He states that the insurgents do not exceed 250 and that the natives generally are loyal.

Failed to Clear Main Track.

Kansas City, Mo., Dec. 28.—Train No. 9, known as the "Red Hammer," of the Chicago and Alton Railroad, which Monday night left for Kansas, ran into a freight train near Farber, Mo., early yesterday. Three trainmen were killed, according to a statement of local official of the road. None of the passengers were injured. The passenger struck the caboose of the freight which had failed to clear the main track in going on to a switch.

Dr. Ami Retires.

Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Dr. H. M. Ami, for 28 years on the staff of the Dominion Geological Survey Department, has found it necessary to retire permanently from the Government employ, owing to ill-health, and has applied for his retiring allowance. Dr. Ami returns to Italy this week.

A Bargain Hunter.

Montreal, Dec. 28.—By someone's blunder in a French paper, the Sellers-Gough fur store was placed in the position of selling a sealskin coat for \$2.95, instead of \$255. A. L. De Martigny demanded a coat at that price, which the store people declined to give, and yesterday Mr. De Martigny entered suit to secure the coat, as advertised.

Priest Risked His Life.

Philadelphia, Dec. 28.—While vain efforts were being made to rescue her, and after a priest, who had risked his life on the thin ice, had administered to her the last rites of the church, Margaret Shaw, aged 19 years, sank to death yesterday under the ice of the Schuylkill River.
