St. John T. and L. Council Protest

Whereas it is the opinion of this mass meeting held under the auspices of the St. John Trades and Labor Council in the York theatre, St. John, N. B., that the miners of Vancouver Island are not getting a square deal, and

Whereas notwithstanding the efforts of the miners' organization to bring about a peaceful settlement, the mine operators have refused to meet the committee of the men's union at all times, and

Whereas the employment of militia and special police being warranted, and under the circumstances the men have behaved admirably.

Therefore be it resolved that this meeting of workers, organized and unorganized, demand that the Dominion Government immediately investigate the conditions which led up to the strike, and that the imprisoned miners be released, such savage sentences as dealt out by Justice Howay being unjustifiable.

Copies to be sent to Premier Borden, Premier McBride, B.C. Minister of Justice, Minister of Labor, Hon. J. D. Hazen, and the Hon. Dr. Pugsley.
