LOCAL NEWS
The Boston train was half and the C. P. R. an hour late today.

While on his travels Engineer Murdoch was this morning brought to the Atlantic Express and went through to Halifax to embark.

The Allan Line's Tunisian sailed about one o'clock this afternoon for Halifax and Liverpool with a good cargo. From the ship's deck, several saloons, twenty-five second cabin and eighty stowage passengers. A large number of other passengers arrived on the Atlantic Express and went through to Halifax to embark.

There is absolutely no truth in the report published that Mount Allison Ladies' College is, or has been quarantined because of scarlet fever. Several mild cases of this disease were discovered several weeks ago, but the sufferers were at once isolated and classes went on as usual, the health authorities deeming quarantine entirely unnecessary. Reports to the contrary are absolutely false. The pupils who were ill will be out of the hospital in day or so.

Alderman Vanward is somewhat puzzled over the settlement of a bet which he made a short time ago. It was with regard to the amount of money collected on Tuesday, Ald. Vanward was of the opinion that the Kindergarten Association would secure more than \$1200. His friend held otherwise. After the money was counted a report appeared in the paper that any who had been betting on the result, and had their winnings at the Kindergarten Association, Ald. Vanward won, and is ready to contribute but he scarcely knows how to get the money. The bet was clear made especially for the occasion. It is to be a good cigar, but it will also be slightly larger than the average, perhaps a little too big for comfortable smoking. The question is, will he be devoted to Kindergarten work.

HAD AN EXCUSE FOR BEATING HIS WIFE

Holloworth Turner Says She Deserved It for Neglecting Her Family—Prince Remanded for Examination.

There were seven drunks in the police court this morning. All were disposed of in the usual manner.

Louis Golding was charged with stealing \$30 from a Swede named Walter Nelson. The defendant pleaded guilty. Nelson, with the aid of an interpreter, gave evidence that he and Golding had been working in the woods at South Bay for James Lovell and was paid off on Tuesday. On Wednesday night he was intoxicated and was invited by Golding to sleep with him in James Brennan's Union Hotel on Charlotte street. He counted out his money which amounted to \$33 in the presence of the defendant before he went to bed. About three o'clock in the morning the defendant awoke the witness and said that he had been robbed. Witness then discovered that he also had been robbed, and yesterday he made a complaint to the police. Detective Kilien informed the court that only four dollars was found on the prisoner but he has been making a large number of purchases since the robbery. The prisoner was remanded.

Holloworth Turner was charged by his wife with beating her in their home on Rodney street, West End, on Tuesday last. Mrs. Turner said that because she would not answer a question as to what she had been doing all morning her husband struck her and then kicked her down the stairs, and also threw her clothing after her.

The husband took the stand and said that he only put his hand over his wife's mouth. He made a kick at her but did not land. He said that his wife had greatly neglected their child and him, that she left his home, once before and then had him charged with no-support. He said she was considered by her own people as being half crazy. She did not prepare his meals, and while he was lying in bed she visited him to find out how he was.

The magistrate said that Turner was technically guilty of assault, but he dismissed the case.

George A. Prince, accused of uttering worthless checks and forgery, was before the court this morning, and at the request of his attorney, W. W. Allan, was remanded to jail until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

CITY WILL REMOVE ONE OF THE BOULDERS AT NO. 6

The Decision of the Harbor Committee—Other Boulder May be Allowed to Remain Until Spring.

A meeting of the harbor committee of the board of public works was held this morning at city hall, with Ald. McGoldrick in the chair. This meeting was called to discuss the report on the condition of No. 6 boulder submitted by the city's inspector. The report was to the effect that there are still two boulders in the berth, a very large one with about 29 feet of water over it and a small one which is covered by about 23 feet of water.

The committee decided this morning to instruct the harbor master to have the smaller boulder removed. This will be done at the city's expense as the cost will be small and it is desired to save the time that would be spent communicating with Ottawa if the government were requested to do the work. Soundings will be taken again to make absolutely sure of the depth at which the other boulder lies and if it is deemed safe it will be allowed to remain there and then the berth will be put into immediate use. If this is done steps will be taken in the spring after the conclusion of the winter business to have the boulder removed in order to be perfectly sure that the berth will be safe for any vessel that may be there.

HOW ALD. MCGOLDRICK FIGURES IT OUT

There seems to be some uncertainty even among those most interested regarding the position of the city in the settlement of the McArthur and McVey case. This is the way Ald. McGoldrick figures it out. The city pays \$15,000 in settlement, but retains the deposit, thus bringing the amount lost down to \$12,300. McArthur and McVey's contract was \$7,500 lower than the nearest tender. If they had not tendered the city would have had to pay for this extra amount and deducting this which was really saved, makes the city's net loss \$4,800. Taking into consideration the fact that the profiles were in error, the Alderman thinks that the city got off very easily.
