The June Bride In Zululand



THE TROUSSEAU OF A ZULU BRIDE. 1. Mankwepent (a pearl ornament worn on the forehead until the first child is born). 2. Amagcagana (a pearl necklace). 3. Umlanga (a snuff-box made of bamboo with pearl ornaments). 4. Unagangul (pearl rings worn around the hips and neck). 5. Umusaka (a stiff white pearl necklace). 6. Umngxoxo (a string of pearls worn around the ankles and wrists). 7. Umlimi (a string of pearls hanging from the neck over the chest). 8. Unqungulu (a pearl head-dress). 9. Isidhanga (a peculiarly braided pearl string worn round the wrists and ankles). 10. Isesego (a loin-cloth for girls, made of pearls). 11. Umutha (the same as No. 11, but more richly ornamented). 12. Iquelo (a pearl head-dress). 13. Unshoto (a cloth worn over the shoulders). 14. Idhlelo (snuff-boxes). The Zulu "June bride" is busily engaged preparing her trousseau, even as is the Canadian bride-to-be. But there is this difference—the Zulu girl doesn't have much sewing and fitting to do; her dressmaker doesn't take up much of her time. With ruffles and tucks, embroidery and laces she is unacquainted, concentrating all her time and attention on beads. Beads, beads, beads make up the Zulu bride's wedding gown. For months before the happy event she is busy threading beads; brightly colored glass beads are to her as the apple of her eye; she dreams of them at night, for right well she knows that her sweetheart will admire her in proportion to the brightness and the number of the beads that she can put on the wedding day. Zulu marriage customs are peculiar in more than one instance. To begin with no two ceremonies are exactly alike. In some localities it is very stylish to buy the wife from her father for so many heads of cattle; in other parts they deem that plan very indecent, but think it all right to steal the bride, a proceeding in which the girl often helps if she is in love with her suitor. In one tribe the best goes to the wooing. Here the girl picks out the young man she likes best, goes to his house, or kraal, as they call it, and sits outside on the fence until he notices her. If he feels like saying "yes" he invites her in to meet his folks, asks her to stay for dinner, and then after that they just consider themselves married. But should he feel that he couldn't be nothing but "a brother" he takes a delicate way in turning down the ardent damsel's proposal, by handing her a burning fago, the meaning of which is lost to a non-Zululander. The Zulu bride must never mention her husband's name out of her own house; if the name means anything, or resembles a word in common use, that word must be avoided, too. On the other hand the bridegroom has certain restrictions placed upon him too. For instance, he must never meet his mother-in-law face to face; nor must he ever talk to her, nor she to him. An unmarried woman of mature years is almost unknown among the Zulus and old bachelors too are scarce. Those simple savages think that every man and woman should be married when they are old enough; and that they should have children, too.

CARPENTERS EXPECT TO SECURE 50 RATE. Most of the Contractors Have Already Conceded it and Men will go to Work Today as Usual.

At a special meeting of the carpenters' union held Saturday evening, it was reported that over one-half of the contractors had agreed to concede the request for \$2 a day, and had asked their men to come to work as usual today. A number of other contractors are expected to grant the increase today, and it is not anticipated that there will be any trouble of importance. It was stated that three or four small contractors, who have shown a disposition to resist the demand, will be without workmen this morning, as their employes have received jobs with contractors who have agreed to concede the advance and will go to work for their new employes this morning. One of the officials of the union stated that nearly all the contractors recognized the justice of the demand of the men, as they were well aware that the carpenters did not average more than \$10 a week during the year owing to time lost. "Some contractors," he added, "objected to paying \$2 to what they call poor men. Our reply to this was that the union did not make poor carpenters, that the contractors themselves were to blame if there were poor men in the trade. None of them employ regular apprentices, or made any effort to teach their employes to be good craftsmen."
