

### AUTHORITIES SHOULD FIGHT FEVER PLAGUE

#### George Bradbury, M. P., Says Government Should Spend \$10,000,000 a Year to Combat Typhoid Fever Menace.

Ottawa, Ont., May 16.—The Dominion government spends about ten million dollars a year on military matters and not a cent to fight typhoid fever, which is killing thousands of our people every year. It seems to me that the government would do well to spend as much to protect the health of the public as it does on military matters," said George Bradbury, M. P., chairman of the special committee appointed to deal with the pollution of rivers and streams in Canada during the sitting of that body today.

"Would it not pay the government to employ a special board of sanitary engineers to deal with the problem confronting us?" asked Mr. Bradbury, of R. S. Lea, a Montreal hydraulic engineer, who was a witness before the committee.

"It would be money well spent," answered Mr. Lea. "There is not a special course of sanitary engineering given in any of the Canadian universities; the government would do well to provide chairs of sanitary engineering in the universities of Canada."

"If this problem we are dealing with were taken hold of systematically by the government how much would the typhoid be reduced?" questioned the chairman.

"Three hundred per cent. and it would considerably reduce the probability of typhoid epidemics."

The outcome of Mr. Bradbury's suggestions will be that parliament will be asked to vote a large sum of money to employ chairs of sanitary engineering in the universities and for the formation and upkeep of a central board to deal with the problem.

C. H. MacLeod, vice-dean of the faculty of arts at McGill University, and Wm. Kennedy, consulting hydraulic engineer of the City of Montreal, concurred in the views expressed.

Continued from page 1. been made in regard to the rate of interest, the rate of exchange and agency charges. Provision had also been made for the sterilization of bank's notes by the Treasury Board with a view to protecting the public health. Certain other provisions had been made to protect the public in the incorporation of banks and the issues of commencement business. Moreover bank officers were made liable if they received any consideration in connection with granting loans.

During discussion of the interpretation clause, Mr. Carvell (Carleton, N. B.), insisted that houses should be included in the list of animals upon which farmers could raise money. The reply of the Finance Minister was that the intention of the committee to extend the lien not to farmers generally but to ranchers in the most severe form. Transfer of Bank Shares. There was considerable discussion on the clause relating to the transfer of shares, which provides that no transfer of bank shares shall be valid unless the person making the transfer has previously discharged all his debts or liabilities to the bank which exceed in amount the remaining stock, if any, belonging to such person, valued at the then current rate. Mr. Carvell (Carleton, N. B.) stated that this was a discrimination in favor of a bank and thus placed it in an exceptional position as compared with mercantile or manufacturing companies. The Minister of Finance explained that the view of the committee was that by this provision investment in bank shares would be encouraged. The clause was allowed to stand for further consideration.

Mr. McKay (Prince Albert), asked whether the question of minimum salaries for bank officials had been considered. Hon. Mr. White replied that it had been considered, but that incorporation of legislation in the act on that point. He quite agreed, however, that bank employees, more especially the small branches and clerks in banks generally, were inadequately paid.

Better Pay for Clerks. Mr. Oliver (Carleton) in the remarks of the member for Prince Albert, certain of the banks, he said, had been systematically importing clerks from the old country. That was all the evidence necessary, he thought, to show that the salaries of junior bank clerks was insufficient. It had been found necessary in most of the mechanical employment of the men to band together and form unions in order to obtain fair wages. It was not possible for bank clerks thus to protect themselves, and he submitted it was, therefore, the duty of parliament to secure to them a minimum wage.

Bank clerks, he added, handled a great deal of money, in fact all the money of the country, and should be well paid. It was a fact that there had been a great deal of dishonesty among minor bank officials in Canada, said to be due to the small salaries paid to them and to the conditions under which they were obliged to live.

Their "Social Status." Mr. Carvell was not so sure that that was the real reason for defalcations. "If we could get it out of their heads that they are bound to be social leaders in the community," it would go a long way toward correcting the evil, he said. He thought that on the whole bank clerks were fairly well paid.

"Not the juniors," interjected R. B. Bennett. The main cause of defalcations among bank clerks, Mr. Lemieux thought, was their proneness to patronize the bucket shops in order to get rich quick. "If the Minister of Justice would attend to this," he said, "and see that young men are not allowed to trade in stocks, it would be a good thing." As for salaries, he thought \$300 a year was a very good start.

At this point Major Sam Simpson announced that he had two amendments to offer, which he had proposed to the committee and would give notice of them in the order of the day. The first amendment was to amend the clause under the proper names. At the suggestion of the minister of Finance such clauses were allowed to stand and the committee proceeded to run through the bill adopting the clauses to which amendments were not being moved.

that there should be some definition of "rancher" in the act, but R. B. Bennett (Carleton), did not believe the word susceptible of exact statutory definition in the present case. The proposed section should be amended, so as to make it permissible for banks to lend money to ranchers or farmers, he said, on the security of cattle, and the impossibility of fully defining "rancher."

Sir Wilfrid Laurier thought that there would be complications by Mr. Bennett's suggestion. It would bring confusion as to the distinction of the meaning between the two words.

Mr. Bennett, however, did not think the word "rancher" comprehensive enough and he went on to say that he himself did not believe the provision as to registration would be useful.

The discussion was continued till ten o'clock when the House adjourned.

### THE N. W. TERRITORIES

The Northwestern Territories began to assume constitutional form and shape thirty-one years ago today, when Alberta, Saskatchewan, Assiniboia and Athabasca were placed under the administration of a lieutenant-governor and a council of five members, subject to instructions given by order in council or by the Dominion. Regina became the seat of local government for all four districts, which had a combined area of 555,640 square miles. These four districts had been formed in 1876, and were at first governed by Manitoba, following the acquisition of the territory by the Dominion from the Hudson's Bay Company in 1870. In 1888 a legislative assembly was created for the Northwestern Territories. Later the districts were given representation in the Dominion parliament, and finally attained full responsible government.

The final step was taken in 1906, when the territories were formed into the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan and admitted into the Dominion.
