WILL REPLACE THE ATHENIA.

The Donaldson liner Saturnia will take the place of the Athenia, and take the sailing from Glasgow to St. John on December 26th instead of the 15th.

MANCHESTER BOAT ON DOCK.

The S. S. Manchester Commerce entered the dry dock at St. John's, N.B., on the 15th. The repairs will take a considerable time, as some special plates have to be imported.

ALLAN LINE MOVEMENTS.

S. S. Cornelia was 465 miles east of Cape Race November 19th. She is due at Quebec Saturday forenoon, and Montreal Sunday morning.

S. S. Tunisian was 600 miles west of Malin Head at midnight on Monday, and is due at Liverpool this morning.

THE J. L. COLWELL DAMAGED.

Schooner J. L. Colwell has been towed into Rockland, Me., full of water and with her bottom badly damaged. The schooner, while bound from St. John, N. B., for Boston with lumber, struck on Otter Island in Mussel Ridge Channel. A wire from Mr. J. W. Smith at Rockland, says that the deck of the schooner J. L. Colwell would be removed and the vessel examined to determine the extent of the damage.

SCHOONER FLOATED.

The schooner Monie Memmie which was recently reported as sunk in Harbor Bouche, N. S., has been found, according to word received. The vessel will be towed to Port Hawkesbury and hauled up on the slip, where the small leak, which caused the trouble will be attended to, and the schooner will be as good as new. Her cargo of oil will be sold at auction, probably today.

TO HELP IN WAR TIME.

Delegates from 25 yacht clubs and two associations of yacht and power boat clubs, representing in all about 100 clubs along the Great River and the Atlantic coast, were in session last week at the New York Yacht Club. The meeting was held at the request of the Navy Department, the object being to promote a better acquaintance among the owners of power boats and to establish a high standard of skill in the handling of such boats. The meeting was called by the officers of the power boat squadron of the Boston Yacht Club and Roger Union, vice-commander of that club, presided. The object desired by the Navy Department is that in time of war these trained amateurs could be recruited as volunteer auxiliaries for duty in the harbors or along the coast. The Maine yacht clubs were represented, Bath and Portland men being in attendance, Commander Holman F. Day of the Portland Yacht Club power squadron, who was in New York last week, planning to represent the local yachtsmen. (Portland Argus.)

TRADE WITH JAPAN

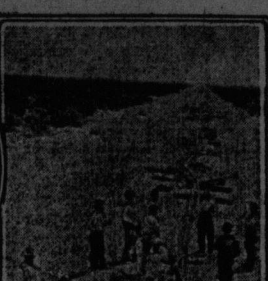

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Evangelist Lowell C. McPherson preached last evening in the Douglas Avenue Christian church on the subject, "Heart Religion."
He took as his text Prov. 4:23, "Keep thy heart with all diligence, for out of it are the issues of life." He also quoted Mark 7:20-23, and in part said: "Our salvation means the attainment of pure hearts. One's thoughts constitute his character. As a man thinketh in his heart so is he. One is saved by keeping his thoughts Godward and his will surrendered to that of God."
"Salvation is not merely saving an entity. One thing we can take into God's presence after death. Not material possession nor the world's glory, but character. We can choose what it will be."
"Certainly out of the heart are life's issues. As a drop of blood poisoned passes through the physical heart, will poison the whole body and cause death, so will impure thoughts ruin a man and drive him to an insane asylum or to prison on earth, and to hell forever. Men need new hearts. Unbelief in the heart, indifference of the emotions and rebellion of the will produce disobedience of the body. The fruit of God's spirit in the heart is love, joy, peace, long-suffering, gentleness, meekness, self-control."

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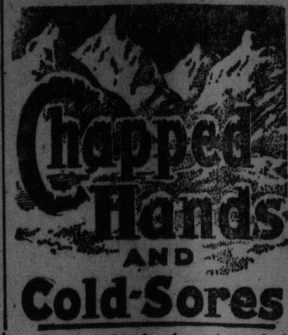
