## BAY OF FUNDY SELF-CONFESSED INSTEAD OF fire with sails set and engine going, but no crew.

There is considerable mystery sur-rounding the burning of the packet schooner Dora, which took place yes-terday afternoon off Black River, in the Bay of Fundy. Yesterday morning Charles Huggard,

Yesterday morning Charles Huggard, William Johnston, G. M. Barber and Ogdon Smith left the city in an autocombile and went as far as Black River. They obtained Captain Johnston's motor boat, and with a tender in tow went out in the bay cod fishins. About 3.30 o'clock the four men were surprised to see a schooner on fire and sailing round in a circle not a great distance from the shore. The sails were set, and her engine was working. There was no sign of any of the crew on board, and when those in the motor boat gave chase they found they could not overtake the ressel with the motor boat while they towed the tender, so two of the party were left in the small horse.

It was seen that the schooner's wheel was lashed hard over, and this caused the craft to sail round in the caused the party got close.

The schooner Dora traded between Parrsboro and St. John, and yesterday morning is said to have been tied up in the Market Slip. She was not fully loaded with freight at the time, and a shipper for one of the wholesale houses said that he had some freigh to go on the vessel, and when he called to make arrangements the commander stated that he was going to take his vessel to the blocks to have some repairs made to her shoe. 



the Russians withdrew are only six miles from the centre of the capital and these defences appareally were carried last night, the inner line of defenses being captured in time to enable the victors to enter the city early this morning.

The statement from Petrograd that the Russian refirement to the Blonle-Nadzary tront had been carried out unhindered was taken here to indicate that the Grand Duke Nicholas had everything in readiness for the evacuation of Warsaw itself, and the announcement in today's Berlin statement that only a stubborn rear guard blocked the advance of the Germans seems to confirm that the main army, with its guns, has escaped being caught in the diffadel.
