The committee in charge consisted of Mesdames Martinson, Lilley, Woodworth, Westmorland, Barrett and Sloane. The large sum realized will be used in renovating the primary room of the church.

## HALIFAX WOMEN READY.

The committee of National Service for Women, appointed by the Halifax Local Council of Women has been busy during the last fortnight in taking a Registry of those who are willing "to do their bit," either by taking up the work of men who have enlisted for active service, or by volunteering to do such kinds of farm labor as they can or in other ways helping to increase food-production.

A considerable number of women have registered, and among the occupations which they are prepared to take up are bookkeeping, stenography,

and clerical work of all kinds, commercial travelling, and sales agencies and selling in stores. Many of them have already had experience in such work. Others are willing to undertake the lighter forms of agricultural work such as weeding, berry-picking, hay-making, apple-gathering and packing, etc. Several young women are desirous of being trained as chauffeurs. A number of School teachers are willing from patriotic motives to do useful work during their holidays. Any employer, whose men are going on foreign service may apply any time to the Registry for women to fill the vacancies so made.

## CHAMPION GIRL SCOUT.

Miss Della Damon, sixteen years old, of New Bedford, Mass., has added another championship to the long list produced in New England. Miss Damon is the champion girl scout of the United States and Canada. Besides her sleeve full of merit marks she has received eight gold merit medals from England. Her merit marks on the sleeves in order are:—Boatmanship, house-

keeping, electrical work, athletics, civics, music, cooking, invalid cooking, clerical, public health work, ambulance work, child nursing, signalling, home nursing, cycling, path-finding, swimming, laundry work, needlework, art work, marksmanship, chauffeur, and wireless telegraph operating.
