The official Austrian statement of yesterday said the Italians had begun an offensive on a thirty-seven mile front from the region of Tomino to a point near the Adriatic. The struggle was said to be raging with the greatest bitterness. Yesterday's Italian official statement did not mention the offensive.

CANADIANS NOW IN STRONG POSTS NEAR LENS DI

New Positions Give Command of Last Bit of Ground from Which Defenders of City Could Overlook Our Ad-

(By Stewart Lyon, special correspondent of the Canadian Press.)
Canadian Headquarters, Aug. 2.—
Northwest of Lens, amid a nest of trenches and railway cuttings which forms the last line of German defences in that quarter, our men have succeeded in establishing strong posts in a support trench which was the scene of desperate and indecisive fighting two days ago.

These new posts give command of the last bit of ground from which defenders of the city could overlook our advance from the west. They are now in a hollow all around the front which swings about Lens in semi-circular form.

The eastern exits from the city are now subjected to a constant and harassing fire of the artillery and machine guns. This makes the bringing, up of provisions and supplies of ammunition very difficult. At two o'clock this morning a trench raid on the enemy stront northwest of Auton, resulted in heavy fighting in the course of which a considerable number of the enemy were killed in hand-to-hand fighting.
