

Labor leaders said 75 plants, many of them engaged in war work, were affected and that 2.000 men were out. At the plant of the B. F. Sturtevant Company at Hyde Park, the property of ex-Gov. Foss, it was said, 250 moulders had quit. E. B. Freeman, general manager of the company, said the men had asked for an increase of \$1 a day and refused to accept a compromise offer of 50 cents.
