SEVERAL CASES IN POLICE COURT

William Devlin and Robert Dowling for Breaking and Stealing Goods from Summer Cottages Sent up for Trial—Other Cases Deal With.

William Devlin and Robert Dowling, charged with the breaking and entering of the summer cottages of Boyer Smith, and Fred C. Kinsman and with stealing goods, were sent up for trial at their final hearing in the police court yesterday morning.

Edward Harrison, Joseph Crawford and J. Hogan appeared for preliminary hearing on the charge of breaking and entering of McPherson Bros. store, Union street. Evidence was somewhat lengthy after which they were remanded to appear Wednesday afternoon again. A drunk appeared and was remanded again to be interviewed by the liquor inspectors.

At the afternoon session, John Sims, proprietor of the Prince Albert Hotel, Mill street, appeared for further and final hearing on the charge of a violation of section 7 of the statutes governing liquor in the province. Some time ago the liquor inspectors visited his hotel and found two partly filled bottles in two rooms. They laid the charge against Mr. Sims, of allowing liquor to be used by his patrons. The hotel register was brought into court yesterday, showing that on the day on which the liquor was found a

man from Sydney, N. S., and another from Kentville, N. S., occupied the rooms wherein the liquor was found by the inspectors. H. A. Porter appearing for Mr. Sims argued that his client had not violated section 7 of the act, as he did not personally know of patrons drinking in his hotel, and was it for Mr. Sims to keep personal tabs on all his patrons? In concluding he hoped the court would consider the evidence submitted, and the facts of the case as presented, and in so doing his client would be freed of the charge. Rev. W. D. Wilson, chief liquor inspector, appeared on behalf of the prosecution. The magistrate in reviewing the case stated he would give judgment next Monday afternoon.

J. Gilbert, proprietor of a second hand shop, Mill street, appeared for further hearing on the charge of purchasing military apparel, contrary to a statute governing their purchase by civilians. Wm. M. Ryan appeared for Mr. Gilbert and argued that although his client had purchased the military goods he had retained them eight days after the purchase, thereby fulfilling the law, and giving ample opportunity for their being taken by the militia again. Captain G. Earle Logan, assistant judge advocate for the district, appeared for the militia, stating that he hoped a penalty would be fixed so as to serve a lesson to others committing a like offense. The case was postponed for judgment, Mr. Gilbert making a deposit of forty dollars.

C. Devlin and step-daughter appeared for final hearing on the charge of receiving goods which they knew to have been stolen property. The girl, at first, consented to enter an acknowledgment for one year, but later reconsidered her former decision, and with her father was sent up for trial. W. R. Scott is appearing for the two.

SHOULD GET READY FOR TWENTY-SIXTH

OFFICIAL OPENING OF THE EXHIBITION

Original War Photos and Captured German Guns Exhibition Opened by Premier Foster Yesterday — Large Attendance and Exhibits Most Interesting.

The exhibition of original war pictures and captured German guns was officially opened yesterday afternoon by Premier Foster, His Honor Lieutenant Governor Pugsley not being able to be present. He was represented, however, by Mrs. Pugsley. His Worship, Mayor Hayes, also made a short address. Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, regent of Royal Standard Chapter, I. O. D. E., under whose auspices the exhibition is being held, occupied the chair and called on the premier to declare the exhibition open. There was a good crowd present and all were loud in their praises of the wonderful pictures, which depict so faithfully the trials and triumphs of the boys from St. John.

During the day, Mrs. Smith received from Governor Pugsley and Lieut.-Col. Doughty, C.M.G., chief of the Archives Department, telegrams of regret at their inability to be present. It is expected that Col. Doughty will be here before the exhibition closes. The building has been prettily decorated with flags and bunting, and presented a charming scene as one entered the room. In the office has been placed a number of small tables, and afternoon tea is served by a committee of ladies of the Chapter.

One exhibit which attracted a great deal of attention was that labelled "Trophy 2,000," gun captured by the 26th New Brunswick Battalion, to go to the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick. This gun, which is a German whizz-bang, was a casualty before it was captured, a large piece of the muzzle having been blown away. Shortly after three o'clock, Mrs. Smith took the chair, and called on Premier Foster to formally open the exhibition.

The Premier said he had a very pleasant duty to perform in formally throwing open to the public the splendid exhibit of pictures and war trophies. He expressed his regret at the absence of Governor Pugsley and Col. Doughty. The pictures which numbered about one hundred and fifty were all actual scenes in the life of the Canadian soldiers, having been painted from official photos taken at the front. He commended the exhibition to the people of St. John, and of the Province, for by attending it they could get a better idea of what the troops from Canada had done, and also because of the purpose for which the proceeds were to be used, the erection of a museum at the federal capital, Ottawa, in which to house the war trophies brought home by the splendid men from the land of the Maple Leaf.

Premier Foster called attention to the gun which had been captured by the 26th battalion, that battalion which had brought much honor to the province of New Brunswick, and his reference to this unit was greeted with cheers from those gathered around.

He then declared the exhibition open to the public. Mrs. Smith then called on Mayor Hayes, through whose kindness the building in which the exhibition was held was provided, and His Worship expressed the hope that all the citizens would take advantage of the opportunity to see the pictures before the exhibition closed.

The playing of the National Anthem by the Depot Battalion Band brought the formal exercises to a close. During the afternoon the band provided a number of selections which were thoroughly enjoyed by the audience.

RENEW THE LEASE OF MARKET WHARVES

Common Council Met in Committee Yesterday — Take Over New Shed at Reed's Point — Other Business Transacted.

At the committee meeting of the Common Council held yesterday morning it was decided to renew the lease of the North and South Wharves from month to month at a monthly rental of \$100. This action was taken in view of the fact that the harbor might be taken over at any time by the Dominion Government.

On motion of Commissioner Fisher a resolution was adopted protesting against the passing of legislation which did not adequately protect the rights of municipalities in the full use of its public highways.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock it was decided to take over from the Engineers and Contractors Limited, the new shed at Reed's Point.

The matter of sheathing the West Side ferry approaches with oak was laid over until today's meeting, when the ferry superintendent will be present.

METAGAMA HERE WITH LARGE LIST

Docked Yesterday Morning With 1,530 Passengers Including 366 Military, 305 Children and Remaining Soldiers' Dependents.

The C. P. O. S. Metagama arrived from Liverpool and docked at No. 8 berth, Sand Point, yesterday morning. The large liner had on board 1,530 passengers, including 366 in a military party, 305 children and the remaining soldiers' dependents. There were 514 cabin passengers and 1,016 steerage. The vessel sailed from Liverpool on March 15 and made the passage in eight days. There was only one case of sickness during the voyage, a case of influenza, which developed into pneumonia, but aside from this there was nothing to mar the pleasures of the trip.

Among the military officers to arrive were: Brigadier-General Chilean Longuey Hewey, of Glenagary, Ont.; Brigadier-General Charles Henry MacLaren, C. M. G., and D. S. O., of Ottawa.

Brigadier-General Hewey crossed overseas as a major in a Canadian railway troop unit and after a brief stay in France was promoted to lieutenant-colonel and given command of the 4th Canadian Railway Troop. Leaving that unit in June, 1918, he was promoted to brigadier-general and recalled to England on special service.

General Hewey was a director of the Courtenay Bay Construction Company and under his supervision the long breakwater was built. General Hewey was accompanied by his wife and three children, and are en route to their home in Glenagary.

Brigadier-General MacLaren, D. S. O., C. B. E., went overseas with the 2nd Battalion of the first Canadian contingent as a major. After six months' service in France he received a rank of lieutenant-colonel and was placed in command of the first brigade of the first Canadian division, which command he held until 1916, when he was promoted to brigadier-general and given command of the entire first division. Prior to the signing of the armistice he was recalled to England and given command of the entire Canadian artillery there.

Lieut. F. B. Conrad, M. M., who also arrived yesterday is making his first trip as representative of the department of the soldiers' civil re-establishment. He went over with the 2nd Brigade Battalion and was in France three years. He won his medal for bravery in the battles about Hill 70 in 1917. His home is in Georgetown, E. I.

The O. C. of the troops on board the ship was Major W. H. Roberts of Perth, Ont. He went overseas with the 46th Battalion and spent three years in France and was attached to the 20th Battalion and the 6th C. R. T. Another passenger was Lieut.-Col. A. W. Winnett of Kingston, Ont., who for three and a half years was assistant director of the Canadian Army Dental Corps in Bedford, England.

A Belgian soldier named L. Vanalaken, wears a war cross and two bars. He left Montreal at the outbreak of the war and joined the Belgian forces. He was wounded twice.

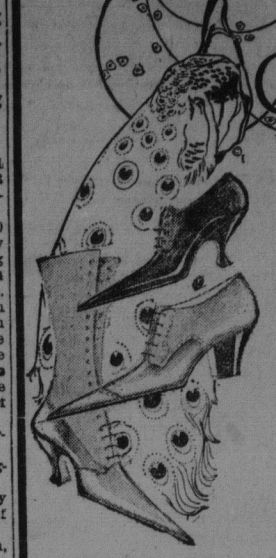
