Obituary

Mr. Henry Turner

Hillsboro, N. B., Dec. 10.—The death
of Mr. Henry Turner, an aged and
respected citizen of Surrey, Albert
County, occurred at an early hour
Saturday morning, Dec. 10, following
an illness of several months. The late
Mr. Turner was a native of Bristol,
England, and when thirty years of
age came to this country, and resided
at Roseville, Albert County, until a
few years ago. He had reached the
advanced age of 86 years. In religion
deceased was a member of the Church
of England. His wife predeceased him
about 20 years ago. Two daughters,
Mrs. Sanford Irving of Baltimore, Al-
bert Co., and Miss Mary, at home.
Three sons, James of Riverside, N. B.,
Charles and William of Curryville, N.
B. survive, also a number of relatives
in England. The funeral was held
from the home of deceased on Mon-
day afternoon. The remains were taken
to Hillsboro, and interment was
made at the Hillsboro Valley ceme-
tery. The service at the house and
grave was conducted by Rev. J. A.
Langlois, rector of St. Mary's Episco-
pal Church, Hillsboro. There were no
flowers by request.

S. M. Starkey

S. M. Starkey died Nov. 30 at Lake
View, Seattle, age 81 years, after a
short illness, leaving to mourn his
wife, 3 sons and 2 daughters, 4 grand-
children, 6 great-grandchildren, 1 aged
sister, Mrs. Amy Covey. He was born
at Starkey's, Queens County, N. B.,
and lived there until a year and a
half ago when he went to Seattle,
making his home among his children.
He was a strong Conservative and took
an active part in Canadian politics
for the past 50 years.
He was a land surveyor from the
time he was 17 and made many trips
to the Canadian Northwest, working
on Government land. In the years 82,
83, 86, 93, 1912, travelling many miles
by trail when the Western terminals
of the C. P. R. was only 140 miles
west of Winnipeg. He was surveying
land in and around Saskatoon before
the city was ever thought of, he also
contracted for survey east and west
of Edmonton, north of Swift Current
and North Battleford. Mr. Starkey
worked up to the past 7 years when
he suffered an attack of rheumatism
from which he partially recovered
and enjoyed reasonably good health
up to within a week of his death.

Veterans Plan For Christmas Treat

At Regular Meeting Last
Night Provision Was Made
to Entertain Children.

Sixteen applications for member-
ship received at the regular
monthly meeting of the Great War
Veterans' Association in the Veterans'
Home on Wellington Row, last even-
ing. Comrade G. Marie Logan, acted
as chairman. A letter was received
from the Hon. J. B. McEwen, M. P.,
advising the Association of the re-
establishment of the D. S. C. R. Medi-
cal Unit in New Brunswick with head-
quarters in St. John. Comrade Doctor
J. A. McCarthy acting unit medical
director, explained the present status
of the unit.
It was reported that all paid up
members of the Association had been
placed on the mailing list of the
"Veteran," and that they would receive
the Association's official organ free of
charge. A special committee composed
of Comrades H. W. Tivers, J. A.
MacDonald and A. I. Macdonald, were
appointed to make arrangements for
the annual Christmas treat, which is
given to those children whose fathers
fell while fighting overseas.

CIVIC WOOD CUTTING.

It is expected that the wood-cutting
camp established by the city at Mus-
quash to help make work for the un-
employed will have its capacity crew
of twenty this week, so Mayor Scho-
field said yesterday morning. Four men
started work the week before last and
cut thirty cords of birch and maple.
Other men were added to the crew last
week, and last night there should have
been seventeen men on the job. It
has been impossible to get any of the
wood cut so far, as the streams are
open and there is not sufficient snow.
The Mayor said that most of the wood
will not likely be used until next sea-
son, as it is now green.

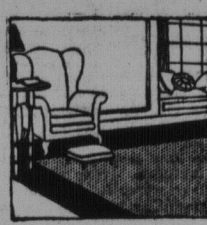

Dry Christmas Holiday Season For New Yorkers

Syracuse, N. Y., Dec. 13.—Prohibition
enforcement officials are determined
that New York State will have the

"driest" Christmas holiday season in
its history, and with this in view they
intend to increase vigilance along the
Canadian border.

E. C. Yellowly, chief of general en-
forcement agents, and John S. Parsons,
chief agent in New York State, ar-
rived in Syracuse today to discuss
steps necessary to a higher standard
of efficiency in the enforcement of
prohibition.

Mr. Yellowly said: "We are going
to dry up New York State if it is
humanly possible to do so. We con-
sider the Canadian border line needs
greater attention and we are going to
see that it gets it."
"New York State is going to have
the driest Christmas and holiday
season in its history. That is true not
only of the metropolitan district but
of the up-state territory as well."
