**Increases Affect Over 10,000.**  
 There are about 8,000 elementary teachers and 60 per cent of them now said. High school teachers number 1,225 and about 45 per cent of them have the maximum. Elementary school principals number 288 and high school principals 24.  
 Heretofore teachers in the lower grades were paid \$25 a year less than the teachers in the fifth, sixth, and seventh grades. This is wiped out and all grades from kindergarten to seventh are put on the same basis.  
 "These increases mean the Chicago salaries very attractive," Mr. Mortenson said. "We are still short of good teachers, and this will attract those we need. We will have a chance to pick. No, this is no time to think about reducing teachers' salaries. Teachers have never been paid what they ought to be."

A Water Carnival on Lily Lake is being planned by the Amateur Skating Association of the Maritime Provinces, who plan on bringing Joe Moore, the amateur Canadian skating champion, and a half dozen of the champion girl swimmers of the United States here on July 15 for the event.  
 A statement to that effect was made by Frank White, president of the recently formed association, yesterday. Mr. White said it was also hoped to have Hilton Bolyea give a demonstration with his racing shell, and that junior sculling, Indian canoes races and swimming races were planned. It is hoped to make the Water Carnival as big an attraction as the Canadian Skating Championships, featured by the Y. M. C. I. on the lake last winter, which were witnessed by the largest crowd that ever witnessed a skating meet in America.  
 Joe Moore, who was a popular favorite during the meet, is reported to be keen on visiting St. John again this summer, and will have charge of the visiting United States swimmers. Amongst the girls who will accompany Moore to the city will be: Ethel McGary, fourteen years old, who recently established a record of 4 minutes and 11 seconds for 300 yards in a 60-foot tank.

## Ted "Kid" Lewis Retains Title

**London, June 19—**Ted "Kid" Lewis English middleweight champion, knocked out Frankie Burns, Australian middleweight champion, in the eleventh round of their bout here tonight. The contest was for the middleweight championship of the British Empire.  
 At the sound of the gong both men began fighting in earnest. Burns had the worse of the in-fighting. Lewis was the better man at close quarters but Burns was his superior in long range work. In the fifth Lewis landed some terrific body blows. Burns vainly tried to hold off his opponent, but the English fighter would not be denied. The referee in the seventh and eighth rounds repeatedly ordered Lewis to break away in the clinches. In the ninth Lewis landed a hard left to Burns' jaw, flooring the Australian to Burns' long count, but was strogy when he rose. Just as the bell rang he received a hurt uppercut which shook him up badly.  
 In the eleventh round the Australian was showing considerable spirit in his foot work when Lewis landed a right hand punch to the jaw, which sent him down and out.

## CHICAGO TEACHERS WIN \$4,250,000 RAISE

**Advances Range from \$300 to \$600 and Affect Every Grade in the System.**  
 Chicago, June 19—Chicago has just given its public school teachers the biggest pay increase they ever got, teaching an estimated total of \$4,250,000 and 1/2 getting teachers in 43 grades from nine kindergarten to the high school principal.  
 "This makes Chicago probably one of the best paid of the large cities, probably from the standpoint of the cost of living the best in the country," Peter A. Mortenson, superintendent, told a representative of The Christian Science Monitor.  
 The raise goes into effect Sept. 1 and Mr. Mortenson said there virtually was nothing further to be done to make it effective.  
 Amounts of Advances.  
 Elementary school teachers receive increases of \$400 to \$500; high school teachers, \$400; elementary school principals, \$500 to \$600, and high school principals, \$600 a year.  
 Under the new schedule the minimum for elementary teachers is raised from \$1900 to \$1950 and the maximum from \$2,000 to \$2,050; for high school teachers, minimum \$1,600 to \$1,650, maximum \$4,400 to \$4,500; elementary school principals, minimum \$2,500 to \$2,600, maximum \$4,200 to \$4,300; high school principals, minimum \$2,700 to \$2,800, maximum \$4,100 to \$4,200.  
 Teachers of trades and commercial subjects in the high schools who do not have college degrees get a raise of from \$1900 to \$1950. The old minimum for these teachers was \$1,800 and it has been advanced to \$1,850, while the old maximum of \$4,000 has been enlarged to \$4,050.  
 Teachers in the Chicago schools are on a ten-year schedule, receiving \$300 additional for each year of service up to ten, which makes the maximum of \$4,000. Teachers will hold their positions in
