ST. JOHN MARKETS

The city market is pretty well supplied with all kinds of produce just now. Butter and eggs are more plentiful than for some weeks past but the prices are maintained at their former level. Game is also more plentiful and the stiffening of the prices in moose, hinds and venison is complained of by the dealers who allege that in the opening of the season there was so much of the most on hand that it had to be dumped. ADMIRALTY COURT

In the Admiralty Court Thursday the case of Albert C. Elkin and Chas. Wm. Elderkin of Advocate Harbor (N. S.), against ship Marjorie J. Sumner, was set down for hearing before Mr. Justice MeLaid; but on application of the defendants was postponed till Tuesday, Nov. 20, at 11 a. m.

In this case there is a claim by the plaintiffs of \$2000 salvage, and a counter-claim by the defendants of \$1000.

The vessel, the Marjorie J. Sumner, went ashore near Advocate Harbor about two months ago, and on the following day the plaintiff vessel, the Marjorie J. Sumner, went out to the vessel in a steam launch and towed her toward Advocate Harbor. They claim \$2000 salvage.

The Marjorie J. Sumner, a lumber steamer, was owned by E. W. Sumner of Moncton, owner of the schooner.

ONLY 35 CASES SAYS DR. E. B. FISHER CAN TAKE THEIR TIME FOR DINNER

Frederick Pupils to Have Two Hours in Future--Big Fall of Snow--Other News.

Frederick, N. B., Nov. 1--The case of the King vs. G. W. North of Harvey, charged with damaging a camp at Magnaguags Lake owned by Hills and Howes, of this afternoon. George Morcovit gave evidence and testified that it was his brother who broke open the door of the camp and not Wood. The case will be continued tomorrow.

As a result of a petition from parents asking that the school hours be changed so that the year round sessions be from 9 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1:30 p. m. to 3 p. m., the trustees have decided that the hours the entire year should be as requested for morning session, but from 2 to 4 p. m. in the afternoon. Heretofore, the schools have opened at 9:30 a. m. in winter, morning session lasting until 12:30 noon, P. A. Good, teacher at the High School, and W. McMillan, janitor of the High School, will be granted \$500 increases in salary, making the former's total salary \$1000 and the latter's \$700.

News has been received here of the death at Brooklyn New York, on Oct. 18, of George Washington Beverley, son of the late Francis Beverley of this city. He had been a resident of Brooklyn for nearly thirty years and was in the employ of the Standard Oil Company and the China and Japan Trading Company, The Misses Beverley of this city are sisters.

This city has a decidedly wintry appearance. The morning fog, heavy fall of snow fell during the night, but the soft weather is causing it to disappear rapidly.

The reports of the civic tax commission, which has been at work for nearly a year, on a new system of assessment, will be laid before the city council at the regular meeting on Tuesday.

Probate Court. The passing of the accounts in probate court in the estate of the late John Lettler was continued Thursday. The only question involved was whether the children of the first husband of the wife of John Lettler were not entitled to a larger proportion of the estate than the wife's interest. They claimed that their stepfather was only a trustee to them and that the property was actually theirs.

The judge refused to hear the evidence, on the ground that this question could only arise on a citation for distribution of the estate, and not at a hearing for the passing of the accounts.

The court adjourned until Nov. 12, when Judge Trueman will deliver judgment on the disputed claims.
