

Mr. Gerndt, as to the destination among the German settlers in destitution among the German settlers in this county, can, from our knowledge of the condition of the Germans of North and South condition of the Germans of North and South Algona, Gratton, and the Bonecheere settle-ment in Wilberforce, certify as to its truth so far as those settlements are concerned, as great destitution did prevail among the Germans in those settlements, several fami-lies being almost in a state of starvation. The Rev. Mr. Gerndt distributed among

them in these settlements the sum of \$97.85, in addition to what he has distributed among the Germans in other settlements, in addition to which there was the sum of \$40 addition to which there was the sum of \$40 expended among them which was raised for their relief two years ago in the town of Barrie, and which was not received at the time until the necessity for it was past, and consequently remained on hand until this summer, and the sum of \$20 sent from the city of Montreal.
