He announced this during a speech he made Monday afternoon to the officers. The duke was dressed as a staff\_officer, wearing a khaki uniform and cap decorated with red band and gold braid. LONDON, Sept. 5.—An official statement, issued by the German admiralty Monday telling of the zeptelin raid on the southeastern counteies of England last Sunday night, was received Monday. It said: "During the night of Sept. 2 several airship detachments bombarded the fortress of London and fortified places of Yarmouth and Harwich, as well as factories and places of strategical importance in the southeastern
