Evidence of continued weakness in
the sugar market is reflected in an-
other drop over the week-end in the
price of both Canadian and Cuban
brands of granulated. Beet sugar
now sells at \$8.40 a bag, and the im-
ported product at \$8.65. Three
weeks ago the latter brand was re-
tailing at \$9.25.

A united service of thanksgiving
will be held on Monday, November
7th (Thanksgiving Day), at 10.45 a.
m., in the Presbyterian church, Glen-
coe. The service will be interdenom-
inational. The worship will be led by
choir of the three churches. The
local clergy will officiate. All resi-
dents of the community are cordially
invited.

Several motor car accidents have
been reported within the last few
days from which no serious con-
sequences resulted. Dr. Frede was
called to attend a man injured on
the Longwoods Road near No. 20
highway, Ekfrid, on Thursday, and
Sunday evening a touring car ran
into the concrete railing of a culvert
near Mayfair, breaking it completely
off and badly damaging the car.

Miss Mabel Wright entertained her
school friends at a Halloween party
at her home on Monday evening. The
guests were all masked on their ar-
rival, which occasioned no end of
merriment. A variety of games,
spooky and otherwise, occupied the
time, and the evening closed with
songs for the young folk. The lun-
cheon served by Mrs. Wright was one
of the leading features in the en-
joyable evening.

The various regional commands of
the Great War Veterans' Association
throughout Canada are clamoring for
more poppies to sell on "Poppo Day."
November 11, than headquarters in
Toronto can supply. The huge ship-
ments of poppies received from the
French orphanage have all been
spoken for, and 50,000 more can be
disposed of at once. The G.W.V.A.
is now absolutely convinced that the
sale of these poppies on Armistice
Day will be a phenomenal success.

W. Ralph Lawrence of the Law-
rence Lumber Company, Sarnia, was
killed in a motor car accident at De-
laire early Saturday morning.
Mark Stover, also of Sarnia and
manager of the Premier Products
Company, is in a critical condition in
the hospital at London from the same
cause. A party of men occupying
three cars were returning from a
society function held in London on
Friday night. On reaching De-
laire the party turned to the north
in the direction of Komoka, but on
making enquiry were advised to
cross the bridge on the Longwoods
road, and take the Mount Brydges
road. In coming back to the Long-
woods Road the car in which Law-
rence and Stover were was in the
lead. Owing to a dense fog which
prevailed at the time, the driver of
this car was unable to see the lead
car, and ran past the turning point,
through a wire fence and into a con-
crete lined excavation used as a cel-
lar where a building once stood. The
car dropped ten feet into this and
turned completely over, pinning its
occupants beneath it. Alexander
Houston, tea merchant, of Sarnia,
the driver of the car, was hurt, but
not seriously, and the other two men
escaped with some bruises.

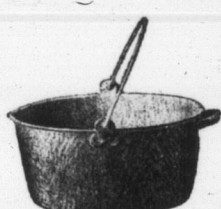
