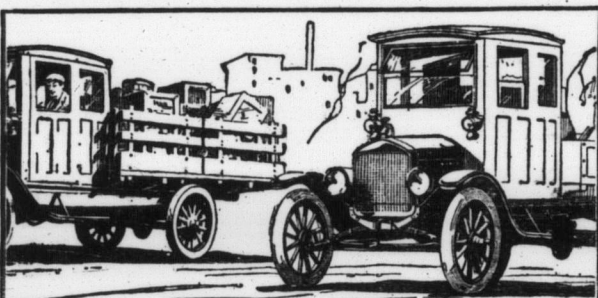

sins, Marguerite and Jean Allan.

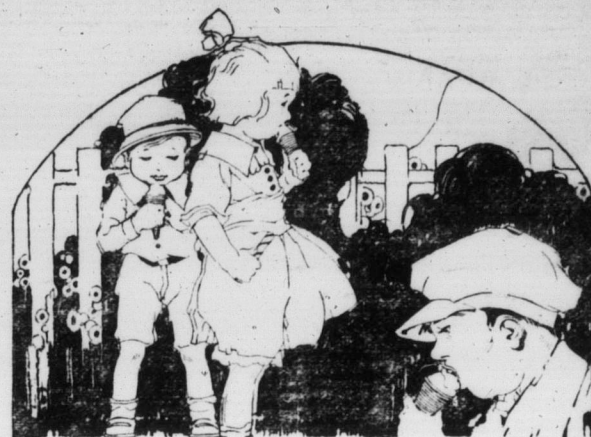

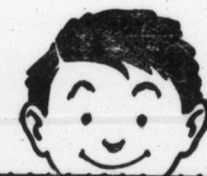
