## GENERAL CATALOGUE OF BOOKS FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN UPPER CANADA.

58. *The Use of the Body in Relation to the Mind*.—By GEORGE MOORE, M. D. 12mo, half sheep, pp. 356. (American Edition.) Price 40 cts.

This is a work of equal merit with that just noticed, by the same author. The *British Quarterly Review* remarks: "This book is fitted to dispose minds to reflection, which may not have evinced any such tendency, and to the most reflecting it will not fail to supply welcome materials for thought."

59. *Man in his Physical, Intellectual, Social and Moral Relations*.—By W. NEWNHAM, Esq. 16mo, cloth, pp. 192. (London: Religious Tract Society.) Price 20 cts.

This little work contains many useful practical suggestions affecting our health, enjoyment and duties.

## BOTANY—VEGETABLE KINGDOM.

1. *Rudiments of Vegetable Physiology*.—(Chambers's Educational Course.) 12mo., cloth, pp. 130. Price 30 cts.

This little work is not intended to include the classification and description of plants, or to be a treatise on Systematic Botany, but treats of the principles of vegetation, and presents an outline of that part of the economy of plants. It is a brief and excellent introductory treatise to the study of Vegetable Physiology.

2. *Vegetable Physiology and Systematic Botany*.—By WM. B. CARPENTER, M.D. 8vo, cloth, pp. 697. (English Edition.) Price \$1.20.

This elaborate work justly occupies the first place on the subjects of which it treats. It is invaluable to the student of vegetable physiology and botany; but too profound and scientific for the beginner, or unlearned reader.

3. *The Vegetable Kingdom*.—16mo, square, cloth, pp. 187. (London: Christian Knowledge Society.) Price 30 cts.

The illustrations, the dialogue method, the topics, the style of this little book, are all calculated to allure the youthful reader to the study of the Vegetable Kingdom.

4. *The Elements of Botany*.—For Families and Schools. (London: Christian Knowledge Society.) 16mo, cloth, pp. 139. Price 44 cts.

This little book contains a simple and easy introduction to Botany, suitable and entertaining to youth.

5. *Botanical Text Book*.—An Introduction to Scientific Botany, both Structural and Systematic. Illustrated. By ASA GRAY, M.D. Large 12mo, cloth, pp. 520. (American Edition.) Price \$1.40.

This book, both in magnitude and merit, occupies the first place in the list of American text-books on Botany. It "is designed to furnish classes in schools and colleges with a suitable text book of Structural and Physiological Botany, as well as private students with a convenient introductory manual, adapted to the present condition of the science."

6. *Illustrated Botany*.—Containing a Floral Dictionary and a Glossary of Scientific Terms. Illustrated. By JOHN B. NEWMAN, M. D. 12mo, cloth, pp. 226. (American Edition.) Price 40 cts.

The dialogues of this book are entertaining and instructive; and its glossary and illustrations add to its value.

7. *Inanimate Nature*.—A Survey of the Wisdom of God in the Creation. Being the third volume of a Compendium of Natural Philosophy. By the Rev. JOHN WESLEY, A.M. 12mo, cloth, pp. 374. (English Edition.) Price 68 cts.

In this admirable volume, a clear and comprehensive view is given of the vegetable and mineral wonders of nature. Every page of the volume is radiant with the light of a powerful intellect and devout heart.

8. *The Geography of Plants*.—(London Religious Tract Society.) 16mo, cloth, pp. 192. Price 20 cts.

Many curious facts are brought together in this little work, and are stated in an agreeable manner. The object of the work is stated in the Preface to be "to give a brief and popular view of that branch of botany and physical geography, which is commonly termed the geography of plants; a study which is yet in its infancy, but respecting which enough is known, both as to facts and laws, to render it one of no common interest."

9. *Plants*.—The Seed, the Leaf, the Flower, the Fruit, the Grass. (London Religious Tract Society.) 16mo, cloth, square, pp. 5 f32=160. Price 45 cts.

This little book, like that of the Life of a Tree, is a graphic and beautifully illustrated exposition of the phenomena of vegetation—under the head of the Seed, the Leaf, the Flower, the Fruit, with a chapter on the varieties of Grass.

10. *The Plants and Trees of Scripture*.—(London Religious Tract Society.) 16mo, cloth, pp. 192. Price 20 cts.  
*Ibid.*—(American Sunday School Union.) 16mo., boards, pp. 192. Price 21 cts.

The title of this little book, and the character of the Society under whose sanction it is published, sufficiently explain its object and guarantee its merits.

11. *The Field, the Garden, and the Woodland*.—Or Interesting Facts respecting Flowers and Plants in general. By ANNE PRATT. 18mo, paper, pp. 203. (English Edition.) Price 15 cts.

The spirit of this little book is devout and affectionate, its style is cheerful and animated, its expositions are admirable, and its illustrations are numerous and graphic.

12. *The Trees of America*.—Native and Foreign, Pictorially and Botanically delineated, and scientifically and popularly described; being considered principally with reference to their geography and history, soil and situation, propagation and culture, accidents and diseases, properties and uses, economy in the arts, introduction into commerce, and their application in useful and ornamental plantations. By D. J. BROWN. 8vo, square, cloth, pp. 520. (American Edition.) Price \$4.

This work is the result of great labor and expense. It is a work of great value—every page being replete with useful information.

13. *American Forests*.—Or Uncle Philip's Conversations with the Children about the Forest Trees of America. 16mo, cloth, pp. 250. (American Edition.) Price 29 cts.
