

identity and of the fact that he was admitted to the United States for permanent residence. An immigrant identification card is prima facie evidence of identity and of original lawful entry to the United States.

(c) Canadians who are in the United States on some status other than that of permanent legal residents, and who desire, after visiting Canada, to return to the United States, will be required by the United States authorities on and after July 1, 1940, to be in possession of passports or official documents in the nature of passports and valid passport visa issued by a United States Consulate abroad.

4. United States Citizens

The new regulations issued by the Department of State relate, in the words of the Department of State's press release, "only to aliens entering the United States and do not require any additional documentation of American citizens proceeding to or returning from" Canada.

Canada has not made any changes in its laws and regulations which govern the admission of United States citizens to Canada as tourists. The regulations are the same as those which existed before the outbreak of the war. No passports or visas are required.

It is suggested, however, that the possession of identification papers will facilitate entry into Canada in case the examining immigration officer at the border should require documentary evidence to satisfy himself as to the bona fides of the tourist. Citizens of the United States by naturalization should be prepared to present their certificates of naturalization.
