have a rational controll is the easiest and the best, and such sentiments openly and without reserve expressed by your Excellency, will realize the expectations of the people, and fulfil the paternal hopes of our most Gracious Sovereign.

On motion of Mr. Pack, seconded by Mr. Carson,

Ordered, that the said address do pass, and that it be presented to his Excellency by Mr. Speaker and the whole House.

Address passed

Ordered, that Mr. Kent, and Mr. Pack, be a committee to wait on his Excellency to know his Excellency's pleasure when he will be attended by the House with the said address.

Committee to know when his Excellency will receive the same.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at twelve of the clock.
