IN THE COURTS Frank Loring was tried on Monday last before Judge Carleton, on the Speedy Trials Act, on the charges of having assisted soldiers to desert. These charges were laid by Officers of the Fourth Pioneer Battalion, and Loring was committed for trial, on three charges. He originally pleaded to be tried by a Jury, but subsequently accepted a Speedy Trial, which took place the day before the Court sat, at which his trial by jury would have taken place. Loring was acquitted and dismissed on all three charges. Two young boys, named respectively Black and White, were also tried by Speedy Trial on the same day, on the charge of having broken into the store of J. D. Grimmer and stolen goods therefrom. Each pleaded guilty, and young Black, who is twelve years old, was liberated, and young White was let go on suspended sentence. On Tuesday last, the regular October sitting of the Circuit Court, presided over by the newly appointed Judge, Hon. W. B. Chandler, opened at the Court House on afternoon. Judge Carleton at his Speedy Trials Court, on the day previously, having cleared the criminal docket, and there being no civil causes to try, Judge Chandler's duties were very light. Before adjournment of the Court the Clerk read and presented him with an address on behalf of the Barristers of the County, which was as follows: To The Hon. William B. Chandler, Judge of the Supreme Court, Province of New Brunswick. My dear Mr. Honor: The members of the Bar, who reside and practice in Charlotte County, take great pleasure, in extending to you, your Honor, a most cordial and hearty welcome to this County, on this, your first judicial visit. They also offer you their sincere congratulations on the appointment you have recently received, from the King's Representative, to a position that is in itself exalted, that carries grave responsibilities in the performance of its duties; and in your Honor's case, the Barristers of Charlotte County are proud to believe, is a just recognition of high standing at the Bar, of that industry and integrity, which always bring merited reward. Your Honor's career at the Bar has been long and most honorable, and the recognition you have received for many years as one of the leaders in the legal profession of this Province, carries a sense of conviction, that your appointment to the Supreme Court bench will add much strength to the Judiciary of the Province, and continue in an intensified degree, that splendid assurance, of which we have always been proud, that in the Courts of New Brunswick even handed justice will continue to be dealt out to all classes, irrespective of these minor considerations which temporarily separate men in matters of sentiment and conviction, socially and religiously and politically. The Barristers of Charlotte County also further express the earnest hope that you may enjoy for very many years, in health and strength, the honors of your new position, and that you may be spared to serve your native Province in the very responsible position which you have now assumed.
