

MADE DRAMATIC ANTHRACITE COAL WILL BE \$8.50 PER TON IN BRANTFORD

Announcement was made to-day of a probable increase in the winter price of coal in this city. The announcement follows the arrival of a circular from the big coal companies, which calls attention to the operation of a State tax in Pennsylvania on the product of the hard coal mines. Formerly wholesale prices have advanced ten cents per ton, but this year there will be an additional 21/2 per cent. The price of hard coal in Brantford this year will be around \$8.50 per ton. The circular received by local coal dealers is as follows:

"In addition to the prices quoted on our circular, dated July 1st, 1913, we will charge, and add to all invoices, the amount of the Pennsylvania State tax on anthracite coal produced in that State of 21/2 per cent. of the value of the coal at the mines, as nearly as this amount can be figured.'
