For more than two years she has been trying to persuade the postoffice authorities to give the postoffice o some one else. Telling her office experiences, Mrs.

rmstrong said:-"I had to turn my best front room into a place for the accommodation of the office patrons. I had to set up letter rack where my best rocker was to set alongside the front window, and the mail bags occupy the place I had picked out for the lounge. "Men come wading through the Hall, opposite post office. Entrance, snow in winter and mud in summer and track my front room all up, and between them and Ed-that's my grandson-it keeps me busy with the dust-

> The official duties in a big town must be simply awful," continued Mrs Armstrong. "We have three mails a week and I have to sort the letters nd papers for twelve persons and put hem in the rural delivery sacks. Two ther patrons call at the office for neir mail. The red tape causes me to se sleep. Reports have to be made the Post Office Department as if ne office were doing \$1,000 worth of usiness daily."
