**Orange Sunflower**  
 Wash an orange thoroughly. Press  
 a fork firmly into the stem end, and  
 with a sharp knife cut from the  
 orange a paring thick enough to re-  
 move the entire skin, leaving none  
 of white. No not touch the fruit with  
 the fingers, but as close to the mem-  
 brane between the sections as possi-  
 ble, first on one side and then on  
 the other, and remove the pulp, leav-  
 ing the membrane. Take out any  
 seeds and place the sections on a  
 small plate and arrange them like  
 the petals of a sunflower.

**Pickled Peas**  
 One-half peck nice peas. Wash  
 and put into each peck 3 or 4 whole  
 cloves. Put into saucepan. Add 1  
 quart vinegar, 1 pint water, or  
 enough to cover peas. Put into a  
 tin cloth 1 ounce stick cinnamon,  
 tie it up and put in with the peas,  
 sugar to taste. When done put in  
 jars and pour in the liquid.  
**Blackberry Jam**  
 Allow equal weight of sugar and  
 berries. Wash half of the berries  
 and sift all but the seeds through a  
 fine sieve. Add the remainder of  
 the berries mashed but not sifted,  
 and simmer one-half an hour, stir-  
 ring frequently. Add sugar and boil  
 5 minutes. Turn into jars and seal  
 when cold.

**Not Yet Converted**

The material will cost more than is estimated as total cost.

**Laurier to Reply Today**

**Fate of Coalition Govern-  
 ment Now Rests Entirely  
 With Sir Wilfrid**

Ottawa, June 6.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will, it is now expected, give his reply to the proposals looking to the formation of a Coalition Government in Canada, to Sir Robert Borden to-day. By so doing he will terminate a period of anxious waiting which has had its effect upon the transaction of business in Parliament, and will open the way to important developments—co-operation in the administration of Canada's affairs at home and overseas or to political strife.

What the decision of the Opposition leader will be is difficult to predict. There was a tendency on the part of speculators on the event last night to suggest that he might reject the proposals in Parliament, and this, however, is quite uncertain. This, however, is quite uncertain.

In the meantime, Sir Robert Borden's very appearance seems to indicate his confidence in the rectitude of the course he has pursued. He has been able to meet every reserve of the Opposition, believing that he was acting in the best interests of the Dominion and the Empire in the present crisis. He had no conference with Sir Wilfrid yesterday, and has been quietly awaiting the latter's announcement on his position away by her father. **AIR BATTLE FOUGHT OVER THAMES RIVER**

**Two Hostile Craft From  
 Raiding Party Brought  
 Down by British**

London, June 6.—Sixteen German aeroplanes came over the North Sea last evening and dropped many bombs on the small towns and villages in Essex. Only fourteen of them returned to their home base, for two of them were brought down by British guns.

So far as late reports show, only two aeroplanes were killed and 29 injured in the bombarded districts. The raiding party with a lively reception, extra precautions having been taken by the British authorities after the recent very serious raid on the south coast of England, in which 250 persons were killed or wounded. The Germans were attacked by British aviators before they had an opportunity to carry out their raiding intentions to any great extent, and the British anti-aircraft guns were very effective.

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entertaining wounded soldiers on trips in sailing boats. The shore was crowded with women and children. The gunfire of the shore batteries caused no great excitement at the outset, it being supposed that they were being used in practice. But suddenly enemy planes came into full view, and apparently within range of the guns. A few minutes later one of them was seen commencing to drop bombs, and amid a storm of cheering it dropped into the sea.

A number of motor boats and other craft manned by sailors immediately began racing toward the plane. The pilot, who was in his seat, apparently unhurt, was seen struggling to free himself from the derelict. When the first boat reached the scene, however, the pilot had

disappeared, and it is supposed to have been drowned.

A despatch to the Times from Essex says: "Aeroplanes passed over the coast-line here in a southerly direction. They were travelling at a great height. When over the estuary of the Thames they turned at a right angle and shaped their course south. White passing over Essex they met a heavy gunfire. One of the raiders was seen to waver and then suddenly fell into the sea. Although the warning was brief, a large crowd assembled and cheered when the aeroplane was seen to fall. Our aeroplanes were seen to go and pursue the raiders. Being so high, the aeroplanes presented the appearance of mere specks but the noise of their engines could be distinctly heard."

most of the people took to shelter. The small number of casualties is attributed to this precaution.

Persons arriving in London from the raided area state that ample warning of the approach of the raiders was given, and that British air raiders were patrolling before the enemy reached the coast. The weather favored the invaders who, flying at a great height, tried to penetrate inland under the cover of small cloud banks. They were quickly located, and engaged by aeroplanes and land batteries, whose defence was so effective that they penetrated only a few miles inland, and, after dropping bombs, speeded away.
