# KILLED BY A PEKING MOB

## The German Minister Reported a Victim --Foreign Legations Destroyed.

London, June 16—A special despatch from Hong Kong says all the Peking Legations have been destroyed and that the German Minister, Baron von Ketteler, has been killed.

Shanghai, June 16.—The train conveying the relieving party with food and ammunition was obliged to return, being unable to reach Langfang, where detachments of foreign troops, despatched on Sunday last, are now endeavoring to repair the line.

### BURNED AT THE STAKE.

New York, June 16.—A despatch to the Journal from Tien Tsin says: "Boxers control Tien Tsin and the native city officials have been burned at the stake. A great panic prevails among the Chinese."

### GOOD TIME TO SELL HOGS.

Live hogs were quite freely delivered this week and brought from \$5.50 to \$6.25 per cwt. Drover John Duff says hogs are now getting a little scarce and he would advise farmers to get their animals ready for market.

The market is now too high for the packers as they are getting no more for their hams now than they were when paying 50c. less for their hogs. Last week Mr. Duff purchased a ham from the dealers in Hamilton for a shilling a pound, which is no more than he paid a month ago.
