The great obstacle which had to be overcome was the precedent established in 1890, when Sir Oliver Mowat declined the request to have the body of Reginald Birchall, the Woodstock murderer, handed over to his widow for private burial, Rice's counsel pointed out that in Quebec the bodies, after execution, were always handed over to the relatives, and the Ontario law should be amended in ac-cordance with that in Quebec. Yesterday's action of the cabinet may result in this amendment being made. Another departure from the course usually pursued is that there will be no post-mortem examination.
