Premier Ross Angrily Denies That He Ever Admi ted the Larceny.

Toronto, Feb. 27 .- The feature of vesterd v's session of the Ontario Legislature was Mr. Whitney's threehour speech on the budget. Almost the whole afternoon was taken up by Mr. Pattullo, of North Oxford, who resumed the budget debate. His speech was a repetition of Government claims and apologies.

It was not until just before recess that Mr. Whitney rose, and he continued his speech at the evening session. Mr. Whitney first gave some attention to exposing weaknesses in Mr. Pattullo's arguments. Would any business man believe that if insurance companies and loan companies were taxed the policy-holders and the borrower did not pay the tax, he asked? What had become of the older Lib-eral doctrine that the consumer aleral doctrine that the consumer always pays? He agreed with Mr. Pattullo that no state or community could show such a financial statement. No Government had ever made a more deliberate attempt to deceive the people as to their financial condition. Turning to Mr. Ross' speech, Mr. Whitney said the Premier had admitted that the Government had admitted that the Government had taken its sawlog policy from the Op-

positions; Mr. Ross-"I did not admit it except for the sake of argument." Mr. Whitney asserted that he and other members of the Opposition had taken down the Premier's words, and that he had made the assertion with-

out qualification.

Mr. Whitney — "The words were taken down by myself and others."

order. Sit down."

Mr. Whitney in a very genial mood, ontinued to speak, however, and the Premier's point of order was not pressed. He went on to twit the Premier about a willingness on this, as on other occasions, to inflict on him bodily harm were his capacity equal to his desires. He attributed the Premier's appear to the batting he had mier's anger to the baiting he had received from his followers behind the received from his followers behind the scenes since he had made that unfortunate admission.
