CAPTAIN CENSURED.

Severe Report on Collision in the St. Lawrence.

Montreal, Sept. 9.—Considerable surprise has been evinced in marine circles at the severity of the judgment handed out by Wreck Commissioner Spain in the case of the sinking of the sailing barge Germaine by the steamer Imperial, belonging to the St. Lawrence Navigation Co.

The steamer was leaving port when it suddenly swerved from the centre of the river and rammed the barge which was tied to her dock, sinking her at once. Capt. Spain found that the accident was due entirely to the careless handling of the Imperial and the master, William Paul, was severely censured and warned that he must be more careful.

In his judgment Capt. Spain sharply criticized the haphazard manner in which the Imperial was run and also recommended that the Department of Marine should deal with the inspector of hulls for neglect of duty in not seeing that the boat was properly equipped.

The damage caused by the collision will probably amount to three or four thousand dollars.

THEFT ON BRITISH WARSHIP.

Pay of Officers and Men, Aggregating \$10,000, Missing.

Plymouth, Sept. 9.—A sum of \$10,000, intended for the payment of the officers and crew of the warship Assistance, of the Channel Fleet, is reported to be missing.

As the result of this discovery, a warrant has been issued for the arrest of an officer, who has, however, not yet been apprehended.

The Assistance is the steam repair ship of the fleet, and has been stationed here lately.

The news of the disappearance of the naval funds — an event without precedent in modern times in the senior service—has caused consternation throughout the fleet.

The missing money will be made good by the Admiralty, and the seamen who has been inconvenienced temporarily by the loss will receive their arrears of wages in full.

Modus Vivendi Renewed.

London, Eng., Sept. 9.—The modus vivendi to regulate fishing by Americans in the treaty waters of Newfoundland-has been renewed.

The modus vivendi so arranged, is in terms and fact a substantial renewal of last year's arrangements.

Two Barns Burned.
St. Thomas, Sept. 9.—Fire destroyed two bank barns of T. Harris of Southwold Friday night. All the season's crops were burned, with a loss of \$3,000. Incendiarism is suspected.
