The old school book ring has disappeared, and the series of readers will be sold at less than half the present cost. Not one book will cost fifty per cent. of the price now charged, while some are reduced sixty per cent. and more. Even from these low prices there are large discounts to purchasers of even the smallest quantities direct from the publishers.

It is estimated that on readers alone the saving to parents in Ontario is \$60,000 a year. This represents only a portion of the excessive profits hitherto made by the ring, much of which doubtless went to the political machine managers. SAN JOSE SCALE

Captain Boles has heard that in a test near St. Thomas of the effects a test near St. Thomas of the effects of winter spraying of twenty-four trees—apple, plum and peach—half the number with the lime and sulphur spray, and the other half of each with the mineral water—as recommended by Captain Boles—there was no visible difference as regards the destruction of the San Jose scale, but the shoots of those on which the lime and sulphur was used are longer and of lighter color, and the blossom rather farther advanced, but not more plentiful.


This might be owing to the lime and sulphur cavering the tree with a thicker coat, thereby keeping out a certain amount of frost, which might retard the sap in a tree not so protected. He will be notified as to the appearance and production of fruit when ripe.



The Planet, in common with all other newspapers of Canada, has bean notified by the Postoffice de-partment at Ottawa that on and af-ter May 6th next, the rate of post-age on papers entering the United States will be changed from one-half cent a pound, bulk weight, to one cent for each four ounces or fraction of four ounces.
