DUMMY DIRECTORS.

The Local Legislature at Winnipeg has decided that no "stoolpigeon" can be placed in company prospectuses in future, and the ac tion of the members will meet with the approval of the entire communand the Ontario Legislature should enact similar legislation at the next session.

The Attorney-General of Manitoba objected to an application from an insurance company, preferring later on to cover it with a general bill. The members thought they could not begin too early to stop the practice of giving stock to prominent men for the use of their names in order to catch investors where the merits of the proposition were not strong enough to attract.

The same body will be called upo to consider a new liquor bill to amend the Liquor License Act, containing a provision that in case any interdicted person shall be found intoxicated during the period of his interdiction, a judge may direct a constable to arrest and keep in cus tody such interdicted person for the purpose of the discovery, or prosecution, of the person from whom he obtained liquor, until such interdicted person shall be discharged by order of the judge causing his arrest or some other judge or magis-

This is the kind of legislation the people want, and it would be hard to defeat any Government whose enactments were as wisely considered as the intimations given in these two proposed bills.
