**Mr. Justice Craig on the Trail**

**STAGES HAVE BIG LOADS**

**Messrs. Paillard and the Baron de Silans on Same Stage as Judge Craig**

A mail stage is expected here early this morning, with twelve passengers, two of them for Eagle, and the Eagle stage is to be held so that they can make close connections. The stage reached Indian river last night. It has forty pounds of mail.

All the stages now on the way in from Whitehorse seem to be carrying good loads of passengers, and there are already reaching here statements that the passengers getting off the railway at Whitehorse do not find sufficient stage accommodation, and that they have to wait to get a White Pass stage. Most of them are willing to do this, as the company's stages have made a good record last season and this, not only for the systematic and schedule manner in which the stages are run but also in regard to the improvements in the road-houses and travel generally.

Still, there are many others on the trail. They are coming in on foot, walking from roadhouse to roadhouse; on bicycles, and making first class time because the trail has been so good, and a few with dog teams. Perhaps one of the most unique of the transportation devices yet seen on the trail is the one adopted by a couple of Norwegians. They are making it on skis. There is nothing particular in that, but the skis these two men are using have handles up to the man's waist, and behind they carry the baggage. Down the hills these men shoot past the stage at a great gait, but up hill they often have to pack their baggage and the skis too.

Among those who are traveling on the White Pass stages there was a large party leaving Whitehorse at seven o'clock on Monday morning, consisting of Mr. Justice Craig, D. McLeod, M. Deshrisay, Emil Weinheim and Mrs. Weinheim, A. B. Curtis, H. Pengelly, F. L. Gwillim, L. Paillard, Paul Paillard, Baron de Silans and A. W. H. Smith.

Another stage left Whitehorse yesterday morning with the following passengers: William, John and Robert Scouse, G. E. Boyd, P. A. White, W. L. Gibson, A. W. Conklin, D. Hardie, J. R. Adams, Mabel Williams and A. Day.

The stage which left Whitehorse yesterday afternoon had on board: G. J. Lennox, E. Swanson, Gus Stratton, J. A. Crouse, Mrs. Dickie, E. M. White, William Dunham, R. L. Palmer, Mary Nevitt and Miss McCarty. This stage carries 123 pounds of mail.

## CLARKE VS. THE UNION

**He Gets After Typographical Men**

**AND ISSUES A SHORT DEFINITION**

**Denies That the Majority of Union Men Support Resolution Passed**

The announced subject of Joe Clarke's meeting for last night, "Union labor candidates, so-called, and otherwise," drew a crowded house as it was well understood that Clarke would deal with the signed statement of the secretary-treasurer of the Typographical union.

After reading the statement, Clarke turned loose. The reference to his candidature, reading, "In view of the fact that a so-called labor ticket," and signed by J. H. Caskey, seemed to be the particular clause of the statement that nettled Clarke.

Among other things the candidate for South Dawson said: "It has always been accepted as a rule that to touch a man's pocket you strain his friendship, but in the Yukon there are many instances where touching a man's pocket has the effect of softening his brain. The printers' union has put up a man of straw to kill in the hope that the slaughter may help Tom O'Brien. No man ever claimed that the printers' union was supporting me. I am as good a labor advocate and as earnest an advocate of common justice for the men who work, as the man who called me a 'so-called' labor candidate. Moreover, if anything were needed to show the spleen and venom of the News push, it is the fact that the notice published was never authorized by the union. The meeting was not dealing with my campaign alone but with all campaigns, so that to particularize my campaign shows absolute want of faith with the meeting, which authorized a notice disavowing all connections with the Yukon council campaign.

"The News is welcome to all the satisfaction it can get out of such sharp, clever, conscienceless tricks. If the feeble efforts I have put forth on behalf of the laboring men of the Yukon merits that I should be insulted in this cheap way by an organization of the strength of the printers, and if Tom O'Brien's record is such that a union of any laboring men can say anything which even indirectly boosts O'Brien and insults and knocks me, then all I can say is that I am content and I have worked on barren soil for four years and more.

"But I deny that such a state of affairs can be proved. I deny Mr. Caskey's authorization to write any such letter. I deny that a majority of the union labor men are represented in any such petty campaign documents. Union labor in Dawson spoke once before when George Gilbert ran, plainly and so as to be surely understood, and any vote of union labor men who are not in the employment of political newspapers with axes to grind will show it.

"The laboring men have always shown confidence in my work, and I defy Caskey & Co. to show one minute of my time when that confidence was not justified. In spite of this I called for insult my course if elected again will be the same straight course for what is right as my last term. Only that the experience of the last two years may be of benefit to me in accomplishing more permanent benefits. Running this time as an absolutely Independent Labor candidate, the cause I have so earnestly at heart may be advanced and helped more than during my two year term just closed.

"It is up to the printers' union hereafter to watch the News bunch and see that nothing is printed in the union name that is not authorized."

The following resolution was then passed by the meeting: "We hereby express our appreciation of the address of Joseph Johnston upon the subject of the right of recall, on Monday night, all the more since Mr. Johnston is plain enough to admit that he is not a supporter of the Independent Labor candidate in South Dawson, as he belongs to the Socialists whose pledge prevents him from supporting any candidate other than a member of the Socialist party. Therefore the secretary is instructed to convey our appreciative

expressions for so ably explaining the subject of the evening."

The meeting tonight is for organization purposes.

NO CHAMBERS UNTIL MONDAY.

It was announced that Mr. Justice Macaulay would hold chambers at the territorial court this morning, but there were few cases for presentation and it was determined to postpone chambers until Monday next. By that time Mr. Justice Craig will probably also be here.

## COLD STORAGE STEAMER CAPTAINS

Captain LeBallister is to be in command of the Robert Kerr, Pacific Cold Storage steamer, this summer, and Captain Smith, who is now on the Kerr, is to be transferred to the steamer Talbot. The latter has been at Nome, and used there as the Kerr was here before the company had such extensive refrigerator premises in Dawson.

The Talbot is to be brought to the Tanana and used as a cold storage warehouse there. In all probability she will be tied up near Fairbanks for the summer.

## FAIRLY TOUGH TRAIL HERE TO GLACIER

Henry C. Macaulay Gets Back Last Night From a Journey to Glacier.

Mr. Henry C. Macaulay got in last night from a trip that he had made to Glacier creek just to see how things looked over there for the coming season. The Swede creek trail was fair with the exception of the glacier that comes down over the trail at Fish Creek. That has given the freighters trouble all winter, and is still likely to give them trouble as long as the trail has to be used as a winter trail.

On Glacier he found about seventy men working, by the old system of fires, but they showed signs of activity in the dumps they had gotten out and no doubt the district was all right.

Mr. Macaulay said he did not have time to look into what was being done at Miller, as he left here only last Thursday. He says there is only one roadhouse, that kept by the Daniels, and for the rest of the journey you have to depend on hunters or miners' cabins and take pot luck.

After a great deal of careful consideration the sports committee of the D.A.A.A. has selected Tommy Burns to match with Burley for the great event of the boxing tournament being arranged for the Queen's birthday, May 24th. This has been the result of a great deal of deliberation and it is a slight disappointment that no definite reply has been received up to a late hour last evening. The manager of Burns was telegraphed a definite offer in the Western Union code, and he replied asking what code the message was sent in. An answer was sent and up to midnight his reply to the offer had not been received.

Tommy Burns is only the professional name of this young fighter. His real name is Noah Brusso, and he is a Canadian boy born at Hanover, Ont., in 1881. Mr. Whalen, of the "M. & N.", who got in last Saturday from the outside, knows him well. He says that Tommy is only 5 feet 7, but he will scale 170 pounds.

Burns recently fought a twenty-round bout with Twin Sullivan at Tacoma, and it was declared a draw.
